# Eco-friendly Fibres, Fabrics, and Fashions

The world of fashion is truly global. Because fashion changes so rapidly, and new styles are produced to meet tight deadlines as cheaply as possible, many environmental and safety concerns are not addressed, and conditions for workers and the environment are often unacceptably hazardous.

Many favourite fabrics for clothing, household goods, and auto upholstery are chemically-treated synthetics with wonderful properties: – stain-resistant, wrinkle-free, permanent press, static-resistant, fire-retardant, waterproof, insect-repellent, – and more. The list includes fabrics like polyesters, acrylics, and nylons that are derived from petroleum; rayon and acetate made by chemically treating wood cellulose; and fabrics treated with perfluorinated chemicals like Teflon. They certainly make our lives easier – but our environment and our health often pay a price.

Textile factories have the same environmental pollution issues as other manufacturing industries. Many use chemical fabric softeners and industrial detergents like nonylphenol ethoxylates (NPEs); chlorine-based bleaching agents; and azo dyes that release cancer-causing amines. Formaldehyde, used to prevent shrinkage of cottons is a carcinogen; and so are toxic phthalates used for printing labels and images on T-shirts. All of these may be present in factory discharges that contaminate our water and environment.

#### What Can We Do?

Like any other factory, textile factories need mitigation and toxin reduction

programs to prevent discharged chemicals from polluting our waterways. And it can be done! The story of the American company Interface, one of the world's largest carpet companies is an inspiring example. In 1994, after several customers began asking what the company was doing for the environment, it launched an environmental program. It found that the company earned \$800 million that year, and used 1.2 billion pounds of raw material, mostly oil and gas (much of which was incinerated). The company introduced a waste reduction program which saved \$60 million and developed recycled textiles for its products. It continues to be a leader in profitable sustainability. For eco-friendly clothing, look for exciting new fabrics like soy silk (a by-product of tofu production), ingeo fibre (made from corn starch), or fortrel eco-spun fabric made from recycled plastic bottles.

We often choose "natural" fibres like cotton - but did you know that cotton crops, which cover two and one-half percent of the world's cultivated land, use 16 percent of the world's insecticides (more than any other single major crop) and immense amounts of water (it takes 175 gallons to produce enough cotton for one T-shirt!). Look for cotton, hemp, or bamboo fabrics and clothing that meets the rigid criteria for Global Organic Textile Standard (GOTS) certification. The GOTS logo shows that the item meets the new standards throughout the supply chain for both ecology and labour conditions. For more information, see www.globalstandard.org/.

#### POWERFUL EXPERIENCE BEING PART OF CFUW DELEGATION TO UN

#### **UWHAW Care for Afghan Women and Girls Continues**

Some 7,000 delegates, including 14 CFUW members, gathered for the 58<sup>th</sup> Commission on the Status of Women at the UN in New York City in mid-March.

Attending is a powerful experience I would urge members to share. Learning that so many women and girls live such desperately challenging lives and that the UN is their only hope, has enormous impact.

However, my focus was the Parallel Session Leila Metcalf and I were presenting on education for Afghan girls. The program was set and polished by the end of January but Murphy's Law prevailed and two of the four speakers had to cancel close to opening time. Emails flew and in the end we had three excellent Afghan women from high places who spoke from the heart.

Fawzia Habibi, now Deputy Minister of Women's Affairs in the Afghan government, ran schools in refugee camps and later in "home" schools under the Taliban. She was profuse in her thanks for international aid to her country but like all our speakers, stressed that the remarkable gains in education made amidst the chaos of 30 years of conflict can be quickly reversed without the continued support of the international community. She noted that the harsh tribal laws and the remoteness of many regions puts education for girls in peril. Like her colleagues, she lists insecurity, suicide attacks, and school burnings as seemingly insurmountable barriers to schooling but emphasizes that education is the best way to fight terrorism. While the upcoming election is a key factor in Afghan's future, she again urged the international community not to abandon her country in its ongoing fight against violence and its dire need for educational support.

With the help of the international community, Afghanistan has transformed its defunct education system of 2001 with less than a million students and no girls, to some 10 million students with 41 percent girls in 16, 500 schools and 210,000 teachers, the most successful legacy of the international community.

So said our second speaker, Asila Wardak (Minister Counsellor to the Afghanistan Permanent Mission to the United Nations), who is a leading human rights and social activist at home. She noted that adult illiteracy is a huge problem which will grow without investment in education and, with little access to education, child marriages will increase. The government is now emphasizing community schools that involve parents at every level, is developing teacher training, and is becoming more creative in addressing many issues. She concluded that the challenges are huge, but her people are strong, resilient, and determined to make their country stable and prosperous.

Our third speaker, Shayma Danesho, spoke from the Afghan UNICEF desk where she has a huge mandate for protection, health, and education in reconstruction and development projects in her native Afghanistan. UNICEF's main thrust in 2014 will also be community-based schools and gender equality, reducing the geographical, ethnic, and gender disparities in ac-

cess, aiming to raise enrollment and retainment, and ensuring schooling during emergencies.

Our PowerPoint presentation set the stage. The audience was large, attentive, and their questions revealed their engagement and expertise.

Leila welcomed attendees and recognized the IFUW, CFUW, and WG-USA Presidents - Catherine Bell, Susan Murphy, and Louise McLeod. In concluding, I thanked our committee members, Leila Metcalf, Dianne Rummery, and Elise Russo of WG-USA. Follow-up opportunities were provided and Louise McLeod's reflections brought the session to a close.

In closing, I would also like to acknowledge Chris from GRYF DIGITAL (<a href="www.gryfdigital.com">www.gryfdigital.com</a>) for his technical expertise, patience, and generosity of time as I worked over time on so many aspects of the session.

### Ontario Council Standing Committees Meetings - March 22, 2014

Mental health was the focus of the meeting on March 22 of CFUW Ontario Council's Standing Committees, with a presentation at the morning plenary session titled Systems Improvement Through Service Collaboratives by Alexia Jaouich and Josina Vink of CAMH, the Toronto-based Centre for Addiction and Mental Health. A collaborative is a group of agencies and individuals who work together to identify and address system gaps in a local community. Now in its third year of operation, the current focus of this province-wide initiative is mental health services for children and youth. There are currently 18 community-led collaboratives across Ontario. One of the first to be established, the Ottawa Service Collaborative, was cited as a model and demonstrated in a video. Hopes are high that the service collaborative approach will result in improved processes and better outcomes

for children and youth who need mental health services.

The afternoon meeting of the Standing Committee on Status of Women and Human Rights was a "strategy" session; participants reviewed their club's plans and activities in advocacy and community involvement. It is very impressive to realize how committed CFUW clubs are, especially in smaller communities where there is a strong tradition of community involvement. Our Ontario CFUW clubs are great fundraisers; several hold annual luncheons or other events with a popular speaker and a mixed audience, and these can be highly profitable. One club raises several thousand dollars for scholarships every year by organizing a massive community-wide book sale.

Some clubs have formed partnerships with local women's and charitable organizations to sponsor community events. Others, like our own Dragonauts, have raised significant funds for local charities by participating in events like the Ottawa Dragonboat Races. Other collaborative events, like film showings, have been profitable and effective in raising community awareness of CFUW's mission and goals.

We were reminded that local issues and events permit CFUW clubs to talk directly to local media, writing letters and submitting articles to local papers and broadcasters. Some clubs have designated spokespersons/contacts.

All participants agreed that the opportunity to participate in community issues and projects and to enjoy the activities and new relationships, is one of the main benefits of CFUW membership.

# **CFUW-Ottawa Decisions on 2014 CFUW Policy Resolutions**

Over 60 people attended the CFUW-Ottawa Resolutions Meeting on April 7, 2014. We thank all members who contributed to the review of the resolutions proposed for 2014 and all who attended this important meeting, Four CFUW resolutions were presented, discussed and voted upon. Two were approved as amended and two were rejected. Here are our final results:

1. AN ENHANCED CANADA PENSION PLAN (CFUW Burlington)

Presented by Maria Neil APPROVED AS AMENDED TO READ:

**RESOLVED**, that the Canadian Federation of University Women (CFUW) urge the federal, provincial, and territorial governments of Canada to work together to increase the Canada Pension Plan (CPP) and the Quebec Pension Plan (QPP) by gradually doubling the maximum eligibility benefits; and

**RESOLVED,** that CFUW urge federal, provincial, and territorial governments to create policies compensating those whose pension contributions have been reduced because of withdrawal from the workforce for childbearing, child rearing, and caregiving for elderly or disabled family members.

A CULTURE OF PEACE (CFUW Standing Committee on International Relations)
 Presented by Dorothy Phillips APPROVED AS AMENDED TO READ:

**RESOLVED**, that the Canadian Federation of University Women (CFUW) urge the Government of Canada to fund and support a culture of peace that:

- 1. Respects Canada's international commitments to human rights instruments, gender equality, and social justice; and
- 2. Includes non-violent conflict resolution processes in negotiations, nationally and internationally.

3. PRESERVATION OF DEMOCRACY: INCREASING VOTER PARTICIPATION IN CANADA (CFUW Southport)

Presented by Lynne Bond NOT APPROVED

While CFUW-Ottawa supports the intent and objectives of this resolution, we have serious concerns about the effects of the proposed Fair Elections Act, including the potential disenfranchisement of many voters. We would strongly support the development of a more comprehensive policy resolution to address all these concerns.

4. PROMOTING PLAIN LANGUAGE (CFUW Saugeen)
Presented by Fran Manning NOT APPROVED

CFUW-Ottawa supports the intent and objectives of this resolution, and we commend CFUW Saugeen for bringing the issue to our club's attention. Many of our members are already very familiar with plain language concerns, having worked in Federal and Provincial Government institutions and professional associations, where communication with a variety of Canadians is an ongoing challenge. However, because plain language policies are mandatory in many public and private sector institutions, we have difficulty in seeing how we can contribute to the topic, and therefore CFUW-Ottawa does not support this resolution in its current form.

# The Sustainable Garden

At our April 7 General Meeting, our guest speaker was Mary Shearman Reid, Master Gardener, Certified Landscape Professional, and owner/operator of Green Thumb Garden Centre in Ottawa. Ms. Reid's theme was 'The Sustainable Garden' and how to achieve it with a minimum amount of work. She did a masterful job of imparting a great deal of information and many useful gardening tips in a very short period of time – starting with having volunteers from the audience provide a visual display of a garden that has colour and activity from early spring to late fall.

Key gardening tips included:

- Put plants where they want to be! Ottawa is Zone 5a
- Plant fall crocus to get a shot of colour and exuberance in the fall.
- Covering your soil with one inch of organic matter in the fall is a lot easier than doing it in the spring when it has to be worked into the soil.
- Continue to water evergreens and shrubs such as rhododendrons and azaleas until the ground is frozen so they don't dry out because of winter wind and sun.
- Get rid of invasive plants such as lily of the valley and those with bugs, such as columbine.
- To get rid of powdery mildew on phlox, use a home remedy that has been in Mary's family for years in May, spray plants with a mixture of 1-2 tsps baking soda and water in a 750 ml spray bottle.
- Water new and transplanted plants every day for two weeks and then weekly till the end of the season.
- Must do's for mulch: make sure the ground dries out before putting mulch down, don't put mulch right up to the plants (leave some space), and top it up every year.

• Fertilizer tip: (and my personal favourite) Fertilizers always contain three sets of numbers which correspond to nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium. Mary's strategy for remembering: – **Little Red Flower** – L=leaf (nitrogen), R=Root (phosphorous), and F=Flower (potassium).

After a very long, cold winter, having our thoughts turned to the wonderful possibilities waiting for us beneath the frozen earth was very enjoyable.

### **CFUW Ontario Council Resolution to be Presented at AGM 2014**

In February, CFUW-Ottawa Issues group members were asked to review a draft Resolution prepared by CFUW Barrie and District for submission at the Ontario Council AGM in Barrie on May 9 and 10. Because of the tight deadline, we were unable to include it in our "Resolutions" General Meeting on April 7. On March 24, the Issues Groups responded on behalf of CFUW-Ottawa. We support the resolution's objectives, and suggested amendments to clarify and emphasize the objectives. Our proposed amended Resolution:

Improving Educational Opportunities for Ontario's Children and Youth in Care

**RESOLVED**, that the Ontario Council of the Canadian Federation of University Women (CFUW Ontario

Council) urges the government of Ontario to act on the recommendations of "Blueprint for Fundamental Change to Ontario's Child Welfare System" [1], the Final Report of the Youth Leaving Care Working Group (2013) by initiating actions and programs, including, but not limited to:

- 1) Improved support to enable all children and youth in and from care to participate fully and successfully in elementary, secondary, and post-secondary education;
- 2) Creation and application of educational benchmarks to enable and promote earlier intervention and better student performance; and
- 3) Increased access to human resources, training, and financial support for post-secondary education.

Please mark your calendars and spread the word to your friends, family, or business associates who may be interested in joining us. We look forward to seeing all of you there!




The mandate of the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women (UNCSW) focuses on gender equality and the advancement of women worldwide. The Commission, whose members are representatives of UN member states, meets every year to examine progress, identify challenges, set global standards, and develop policies on a predetermined theme. The priority theme of the 2014 meeting in New York City from March 10 to 21 was "Challenges and Achievements in the Implementation of the Millennium Development Goals for Women and Girls".

The outcome of the meetings is "Agreed Conclusions", a moral suasion document that identifies issues to be addressed and urges governments to take action. Input from civil society is considered during negotiations of the "Agreed Conclusions". This is where CFUW comes in, as its consultative status at the UN permits access to UNCSW meetings. Each year, CFUW sends a delegation to the meetings. Susan Murphy, CFUW President, headed this year's 14-member delegation. Hally Siddons and I were privileged to be among the delegates.

We attended many of the events on the extensive program of the NGO (Non-Governmental Organization) CSW Forum, including Parallel Sessions presented by NGOs, Side Events presented by governmental organizations, regional NGO caucuses, and IFUW briefings. We networked and learned about the enormous challenges to implementation of the Millennium Development Goals for women and girls worldwide. Equally important, perhaps more so, in the motivating presence of thousands of strong women, we learned of their incredible courage and initiative to make the world a better place for all.



# MARIE CATHERINE "KITTY" KELLEY 1919-2014

Our sincere condolences to the family

and friends of Catherine Kelley, a former longtime member of CFUW-Ottawa who passed away peacefully in Ottawa on Wednesday, March 19, 2014 at age 94, after a full and adventurous life. Catherine, called "Kitty" by friends and family, had been a longtime member of CFUW-Ottawa's Diplomatic Hospitality Service Group and was active in the American Standard Duplicate Bridge Study and Interest Group till last summer. Kitty grew up in Liverpool, Nova Scotia and obtained a B.Sc., Mount Saint Vincent (1940). During WWII, Kitty volunteered for the Women's Royal Canadian Naval Service (WRCNS or "Wrens") and served in London during the Blitz. After the war, her wonderful career at the Department of External Affairs included overseas postings in Cuba, Turkey, New York, New Delhi, Tokyo, and Kuala Lumpur. She is remembered by her CFUW-Ottawa friends as elegant, very attractive, and delightful company – with many stories to tell about her adventures in various capitals around the world. As a member of Diplomatic Hospitality, she drove diplomats for many years, always accompanied by her poodle.

A celebration of her life was held at St. Theresa Roman Catholic Church, 95 Somerset St. W., Ottawa on Friday, March 28, 2014. Her obituary was published in the *Ottawa Citizen* from March 22 to 26, 2014 and can be found online.
