Dr. Thibeault is a Full Professor in the Faculty of Health Sciences at the University of Ottawa since 1992. She has a background in occupational therapy, psychology, and community development. Her work as a clinician took her from acute mental health settings and physical rehabilitation centres in Ontario, Québec, and Nova Scotia to community-based services in the Canadian Arctic.

Dr. Thibeault specializes in Community-Based Rehabilitation, psychosocial care, and issues of meaning, resilience, and social justice in health care. Her work has taken her to many countries but she was shocked by the state of health care in Yellowknife when she was working with aboriginal communities. Dr. Thibeault remarked that the health care in the aboriginal communities was some of the worst that she had witnessed in the world. She began working with the local communities and looked at Community-Based Rehabilitation as a way to offer

Spring is definitely on the way! And, along with longer days and spring flowers, CFUW-Ottawa has lots of new activities and events. Here's a brief taste:

Our new Susan Scott Parker Scholarship was awarded for the first time at our March 9 Scholarship General Meeting. This award for an undergraduate student with a disability at Carleton University, funded by CFUW-Ottawa members led by Fran Harding, supports our 2012 CFUW-Ottawa policy resolution *Full Accessibility and Barrier-Free Environments for Persons with Disabilities*. (This is one way we can turn CFUW resolution-based policies into effective action!) The winner, Sarah Kealey, is a B.Sc. (Hons) student of Neuroscience at Carleton. Also new this year was the Barbara Newbegin Award in Mathematics, presented on March 9 to Katelyn Fontaine, a B.Sc. (Hons) student of Financial Mathematics and Economics at the University of Ottawa. Congratulations to Sarah and Katelyn, as well as to the 20 other winners of CFUW-Ottawa awards and scholarships. It was lovely to meet "our girls" at this special evening. They are a very beautiful and talented group.

The Up For Debate campaign is an alliance of over 150 Canadian women's organizations (including CFUW) whose objective is to raise awareness about women's rights as we approach the 2015 federal election. A major goal is to have all federal party leaders in a national televised debate on women's concerns. The last such debate was in August 1984!

We need our political leaders to support:

- Ending violence against women;
- Ending women's economic inequality; and
- Women's leadership and organizations.

The Up for Debate website at upfordebate.ca/ has lots of information. Green Party leader Elizabeth May and New Democratic Party leader Tom Mulcair are already committed. We urge Prime Minister Stephen Harper, Liberal leader Justin Trudeau, and Bloc Québécois leader Mario Beaulieu to join. Before March 31 we can:

- Send a message to them through the website;
- Sign an online petition at the website; or
- Print a petition to sign, collect signatures, and mail to Up for Debate.

better service and build a path with the community.

Dr. Thibeault's research focuses mainly on community-driven models of rehabilitation services in hard-to-access settings, areas affected by HIV/AIDS, former or current war zones, and leprosy communities. Her participatory action research has taken her to the High Arctic, South East Asia, Central America, Europe, Africa, and the Middle East. She works from a participative perspective that fosters community decision-making at all levels and promotes approaches that build on the principles of sustainable livelihoods, service integration, and social inclusion.

In 2013, Dr. Thibeault was appointed Officer of the Order of Canada for expanding the boundaries of occupational therapy and advocacy on behalf of people with disabilities.

She has a B.Sc. in Health Sciences (Occupational Therapy) from Université Laval, an M.Sc. (Psychology) from Acadia University, a PhD (Community Psychology) from the Université de Montréal, and postdoctoral training at the University of Southern California (Los Angeles) and at the University of Århus (Denmark).

SPEAKING TRUTH TO HISTORY

Our International Women’s Day Celebration, 2015

The 11th International Women’s Day (IWD) celebration co-sponsored by CFUW-Ottawa, Kanata, and Nepean, and the Ottawa Council of Women, was held at Ben Franklin Place (Centrepointe) on March 2. Our theme was *Speaking Truth to History*.

The evening started with a cocktail reception in the Atrium with delicious appetizers from Epicuria. The Atrium held an excellent display of artisania. Ten Thousand Villages displayed children’s books, cookbooks, chocolate, and other lovely items. A new vendor, Re: Purpose, brought a unique selection of handmade jewelry, art, and jams. Tabitha displayed wonderful silk items from Cambodia and The Women’s Foundation of Nepal offered a fabulous selection of pashminas and other finely woven scarves and shawls.

Anita Vandenbeld, a member of the Ottawa Council of Women, distinguished worker for international women’s rights, and co-author of the just released *The Oxford Book of Transnational Feminist Movements*, was our master of ceremonies. Through her wonderful account of a statue she bought from a woman in a thatched roof hut in Liberia, Anita demonstrated the great advances still being made by young feminists throughout the world. Triple Trouble entertained us with an outstanding display of fiddle playing

and step dancing and received a standing ovation.

Dr. Greta Kroeker’s entertaining presentation on *The Early Modern Witch Hunts and Their Modern Legacy* made the evening a huge success. Dr. Kroeker’s area of expertise is Early Modern Europe which ranges from 1450 to 1750, the era that used to be called the Renaissance and Reformation. During that period, Europe was thrown into complete disarray because of huge changes in religious authority, intolerable taxation, wars, poor farming techniques, and significant lack of understanding of nature and agriculture. As a result, society looked for reasons for their calamity and hardship. Unfortunately, too often the mob found that the “cause” was that strange, old, single woman who likely rode a broom and consorted with the devil. And, my goodness, did she consort with the devil! Dr. Kroeker explained how this total shakeup of culture and norms caused unspeakable suffering and scapegoating which was only relieved once we got to the Age of Enlightenment and science came to the fore. Dr. Kroeker truly spoke truth to history.

We thank the many volunteers who gave freely of their time and enthusiasm to help make our event so successful. And we had a great time!

CFUW Ontario Council Standing Committees Meeting, March 14, 2015

CFUW Ontario Council has three Standing Committees: Education, Legislation, and Status of Women and Human Rights. At each of the three Standing Committee meetings every year, one Committee organizes the morning plenary session, and all three Committees meet separately in the afternoon. At the March 14 meeting, the Education Committee hosted the morning plenary with a discussion on “Transforming Ontario’s Post-secondary Education System.” Ontario’s changing demographics have a tremendous impact on colleges and universities: numbers in the 18-20 age group (the cohort that accounts for almost 80 percent of those entering post-secondary institutions) are decreasing and won’t recover until 2036 (and much later, if ever, in northern and eastern Ontario). Universities must negotiate new kinds of funding agreements (Strategic Mandate Agreements, or SMAs) to survive. They compete for students, while students need help to meet rising tuition costs and reduce their dependence on student loans. The future will see growth in student-centred learning approaches, reduced funding, and new funding approaches.

The afternoon Status of Women and Human Rights workshop was on “Using the Gender Lens in Developing Public Policy.” The term “gender lens” was new to many of us. In brief, it can be defined as the art of keeping gender issues, differences, and concerns clearly in focus. Historically, as we know, the “lens” has not focused well on women. Our discussion was on how this can be corrected. There were some interesting examples of social determinants affecting women’s health: a) sexual harassment issues in the workplace and on the street; b) expectations that women assume responsibility for family care including caregiving for the elderly; c) medical field research done using male subjects, with the false assumption that findings would apply equally to women. We can take action to use the gender lens to level the playing field. We can support many groups that already exist: a) Equal Voice to increase the number of women entering public life; b) Sisters in Spirit to address violence against aboriginal women; c) the new Ontario sex education program for both boys and girls; and d) our own CFUW policies and action plans.

From Ottawa to the World With IFUW

When I joined CFUW-Ottawa 10 years ago, I expected to join study groups and advocacy projects, and to enjoy lots of “Fellowship, Fun, and Food.” But I found more! I found that CFUW has a direct connection to international women’s development as a member of the International Federation of University Women (IFUW). Of my annual CFUW-Ottawa membership dues, \$18.69 (about the cost of a medium bottle of wine) goes to support IFUW. What do I get for this \$18.69?

Well, I think that a much more important question is “What benefit do international women and girls get from my \$18.69?” I went to the IFUW web site at www.ifuw.org for answers.

I found that IFUW was founded in 1919 by women from Canada, Great Britain, and the United States to advocate for women’s rights, equality, and empowerment through education. IFUW promotes lifelong education; supports international cooperation; advocates for the advancement of women and girls; and encourages them to assume leadership and decision-making positions. The IFUW vision sees 100 percent of girls and women in the world achieving education beyond primary school!

Every three years, IFUW hosts a Triennial Conference where members of 62 National Affiliates (member countries) and individual members from over 40 other countries discuss emerging priorities, strategies, and actions. Many CFUW-Ottawa members have attended, and in 2001, IFUW met

here in Ottawa! The 2013 Triennial was in Istanbul and the 2016 meeting will be in Cape Town, South Africa.

IFUW supports a wide range of community projects, including literacy and financial literacy; vocational training; promotion of girls and women’s skills and learning; and campaigns to increase women’s awareness of their rights. IFUW’s Bina Roy Partners in Development (BRPD) Program supports projects in over 30 countries. For an interesting list, go to www.ifuw.org/what-we-do/projects/.

Each year, IFUW awards up to 25 Fellowships and Grants for a wide variety of postgraduate study and research projects. See information at www.ifuw.org/what-we-do/grants-fellowships/international-awards/.

IFUW has special consultative status at many international conferences and represents the interests of women and girls in negotiations for new conventions and agreements. IFUW representatives participate in Parallel Sessions of the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women (UNCSW) in New York. (This year, CFUW-Ottawa members Ann Denis, Leila Metcalf, Hally Siddons, and Susan Russell attended these sessions; they report that it is a powerful experience.)

To sum up my very brief sampling of IFUW programs and activities (and there are many more!): Awesome! My \$18.69 is well-spent indeed!

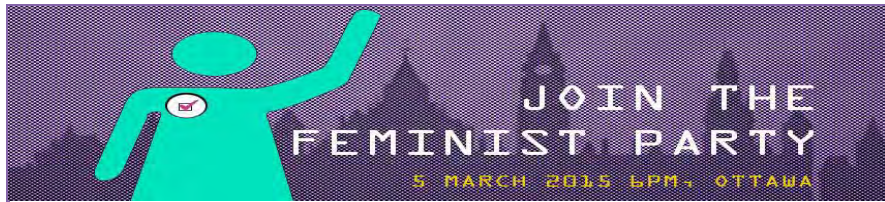

One party was not enough! After our own great International Women’s Day (IWD) celebration on March 2, CFUW participated in another celebration of IWD on March 5. The “Join the Feminist Party” party at Library and Archives Canada was co-hosted by several organizations including our CFUW National Office, Amnesty International, OXFAM Canada, Inter Pares, Planned Parenthood Ottawa, MATCH International Women’s Fund, and many more. All had information tables, many interactive. The CFUW table, manned by our national Advocacy Coordinator Tara Fischer, asked

us to complete the thought-provoking phrase “The Power of Women Working Together....” I had to think about what to contribute, but settled for “... Can Be a Mighty Force!”

The program focused on the “Up For Debate” campaign which urges our national party leaders to hold a debate devoted to women’s issues as part of the buildup for the coming election. Women in Trades: A Walk With CFUW Policy

CFUW takes a proud and leading role in setting policy for our organization by researching and debating resolutions that, when passed, compose our direction and purpose. These resolutions most frequently “urge the government to ...” and are put into action by various letter-writing campaigns or presentations to our elected officials. This is a wonderful system and I applaud all who participate in the process.

Recently, I was undergoing a total change in lifestyle and required assistance in the tasks that it all entailed. Now, we had recently passed a resolution on supporting women in trades*, and it occurred to me that we should also be “URGING” our own membership to be on board with support. So, to put my money where my mouth was, to quote the cliché, I set about seeking organizations and companies that are owned and operated by women — our sisters.

Step one in this major move was to get my house ready to put on the market. There are several firms, women-owned, that provide this service. Due to club policy, I cannot advertise their names, but I can provide that information directly if anyone wishes to contact me. I was fortunate to be able to work with a particular company, which is not only owned and operated by women, but also coordinates with other “Women in Trades” companies and even assists women-oriented charities. This particular service comes in and works right along with you to organize your belongings. Basically, it comes down to a sorting process where each item is judged as keep, donate, or trash. Items that aren’t to be used right away are packed up for the move. Following a recommendation from those women, I was referred to a group of women painters, who were simply amazing. They had taken great pains to research their products and techniques and impressed me with their explanations and knowledge of the job they were undertaking. The next referral that I used was for

a cleaning company and I really lucked in there. The woman who started this business, using all environmentally-safe products, has been so successful that her husband has quit his job and joined her. Then on moving day, the original company came in and finished the packing and then travelled to the new home and organized the moving company and unpacked the crates. At this time, there aren’t any women who own a moving company, so I did use a male-owned company—recommended by the first company—that worked efficiently with our women.

So, we can help those women who have taken the risks and put their services

out there and I am proud to say that I not only talk the talk but have walked the walk. For names and contacts, you can reach me at bond1805@rogers.com.

RESOLVED, That the Canadian Federation of University Women urge the Government of Canada and provincial and territorial authorities concerned with education, employment, and skills development to work with business, labour, and industry associations to address and remedy the underrepresentation and lack of retention of women in skilled trades and non-traditional occupations by adopting strategies to create and promote a workplace culture that is inclusive of women and prevents stereotypical barriers to women’s successful entry and advancement.

Spring CFUW Focus Group: What issues are important to us? Giving CFUW a voice in the 2015 Election

At the 2014 AGM, CFUW passed the following: **RESOLUTION 3 Preservation of Democracy: Increasing Voter Turnout: RESOLVED**, That the Canadian Federation of University Women (CFUW) and its member Clubs initiate, engage in, and promote activities and programs to educate all Canadians about the importance of participating in our democratic system of government and to exercise our right and our responsibility to vote in all elections.

How can CFUW-Ottawa do this as a Club? And how would we keep this non-partisan?

The Canadian Research Institute for the Advancement of Women (CRIAOW) in partnership with the University of Saskatchewan and the University of Ottawa will be hosting a series of Focus Groups to gather issues that are of concern to Canadian women. These concerns and priorities will be presented to all the leaders of Canada’s political parties. CFUW-Ottawa has been asked to participate in one of these sessions.

And who better to ask? We are 485 well-educated, engaged, and opinionated women. We span a wide age range and have issues and concerns which should be addressed and recognized by our political leaders. Are the issues that are important to women in their 40s and 50s different from those of women in their 70s? What issues cross all age ranges? What are our priorities? What do we feel needs to be addressed first by party leaders?

This is our opportunity to put our ideas and opinions and concerns out there to be gathered and presented to all party leaders prior to the election.

We are hoping to organize the focus session for the spring. Depending on the number of interested Club members, we may be meeting in a member’s living room or in a classroom or a board room. We will keep you informed through the *Carillon* and occasional email updates as we organize, publicize, collect names, and attend to the details of holding this focus group.
