#### Part 1: A New Kind of Women's Movement



Ms. Tomlin began her career working with female victims of violence in rural Ontario in 2000. Her international work began in 2004 with

the Canadian International Development Agency in Zambia where she oversaw the health portfolio that included large-scale drug procurement and NGO funding.

In her work with CARE Canada from 2005 to 2009 she was responsible for the oversight of the South Africa portfolio, including response to emergencies and key regional themes such as gender, food security, and HIV/AIDS. In the last two years of this work, she was CARE

## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

#### Heroes and "She-roes"

"How important it is for us to recognize and celebrate our heroes and she-roes!"

(Maya Angelou)

As we begin a new year, it seems appropriate to remember our "sheroes," especially those who labour out of the limelight but whose cumulative work has done so much to improve the lives and health of us all. Recent international news has reminded me of two scientists whose work prevented untold tragedies and changed the lives of millions of people.

Dr. Frances Kelsey is a Canadian physician who recently celebrated her 100th birthday. She almost single-handedly saved the U.S. from the tragedy of thalidomide. Born in B.C. and educated at McGill, she spent her working life in the U.S. In 1961, just a month after being appointed as a medical officer at the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA), she was assigned to review the new drug thalidomide being promoted as an anti-nausea and anti-insomnia drug for pregnant women. It was already being used in Canada and Europe, but Dr. Kelsey concluded that testing was inadequate, and there were indications of serious side effects. She refused to approve the drug for use in the U.S. and remained steadfast in her refusal, despite exceptional, relentless pressure by the drug's manufacturer. Her moral courage saved thousands of American babies from the tragedies of thalidomide. Meanwhile, as we know, thalidomide was approved for use in Canada

and Europe, and unknown numbers of babies were born with severe deformities that included stunted limbs, notably flipper-like arms. Today, 95 Canadian thalidomide survivors are awaiting a compensation offer from Ottawa to cope with the growing toll their disabilities are taking on their health. Dr. Kelsey is a true heroine who protected the public's health in the thalidomide case.

Dr. Theo Colborn, who died last month, was an American toxicologist who worked with Canadian scientists at Health Canada and with the International Joint Commission (IJC)

Canada's Director, Women's Platform, responsible for a comprehensive marketing campaign, advocacy platform, and the promotion and integration of gender-based program approaches.

From 2009 to 2011, as Special Assistant for the United Nations Relief and Works Agency (UNRWA) in Amman, Jordan, she managed large-scale reform for this agency that supports Palestinian refugees in Jordan, the West Bank, Gaza, Lebanon, and Syria.

In May 2012, Ms. Tomlin was appointed to her current position of Executive Director, MATCH International Women's Fund, which, amongst other things, provides direct funding to womenled social innovations that are breaking new ground for women's rights as well as supporting the structural needs of organizations holding ground for women in the global South.

Ms. Tomlin holds a BA in Women's Studies and an MA in Leadership Studies from Royal Roads University.

CFUW clubs or national or provincial Boards for approval at the national or provincial AGMs. Traditionally, our Resolutions Meeting has been held at the April General Meeting but because Club deadlines on Resolutions have been moved to March 31 to accommodate the earlier CFUW AGM, and as our March meeting is our Scholarship Meeting, we have moved the Resolutions Meeting to the February General Meeting. The Resolutions portion will follow our guest speaker, Jessica Tomlin.

This year we have two policy resolutions for the 2015 national CFUW AGM:

Resolution 1: Saving Our Pollinators and Our Environment: Moratorium on the Use of Neonicotinoid Pesticides; and

Resolution 2: Reducing Climate Change Through the Use of Carbon Taxes.

Over the fall, CFUW-Ottawa members formed ad hoc review groups to examine the resolutions and make their recommendations for adoption, amendment, or rejection. Comments and amendments approved by our Club vote will be forwarded to the CFUW National Resolutions Committee, and final drafts will be prepared for presentation and approval at the AGM in Québec City in June.

CFUW is a respected voice of Canadian women and the policy resolutions are the foundation of CFUW advocacy – in Canada and internationally. Resolutions that are adopted at the AGM become CFUW policy, and Clubs may advocate in support of the Resolutions' objectives.

in studies of toxic contamination of the Great Lakes. She was a grandmother when she got her PhD in 1985, at the age of 58!

In 1988, she showed that pollution in the Great Lakes was linked to severe health effects in both humans and wild-life. She and her team identified toxic pollutants that acted by interfering with the hormones that maintain many vital systems. These endocrine-disrupting chemicals are familiar to us as BPA (Bisphenol A), parabens, phthalates, and many more.

Dr. Colborn was a visionary, charismatic scientist and leader. She was the senior author of Our Stolen Future, a powerful report that alerted the world about endocrine disruptors and their effects. Published in 1996, it received wide acclaim. The Washington Post called it "a powerful, haunting drama" and an "environmental thriller". As a senior scientist with the World Wildlife Fund. Dr. Colborn worked tirelessly to educate other scientists and the public about endocrine disruptors and the irreversible harm they cause to wildlife and humans. Her work has been effective: today, because of consumer pressure, companies have started to remove these chemicals from children's toys, baby bottles, cosmetics, household and personal care products, and many more. Her legacy is enabling us to take our future back.

I'm looking forward to 2015, and learning more about more of our own "she-roes." It will be a busy year, with a number of events and projects coming up. This edition of the *Carillon* is full of information about them. I urge you to get involved – remember to "Catch the CFUW-Ottawa Wave and make a SEA (Socialize, Educate, Advocate) change in your life." There's so much to do!

## "Behold! The beautiful woman comes!" (meaning of Nefertiti)



The iconic Nefertiti Bust created in 1345 BC by the sculptor Thutmose in ancient Egypt. It is 19 in. or 48.26 cm high and made of painted limestone and stucco. Permission to publish this photo was given by Mr. Eltaher.

"Nefertiti remains one of the most recognizable and loved iconographical symbols of woman. She is for Egypt what Albion is for England and what Marianne is for France". With these opening words, guest speaker Hassan Eltaher introduced his presentation, *Queen Nefertiti: The Eternal Mystery*, at the CFUW-Ottawa General Meeting on Jan. 12, 2015.

Throughout Mr. Eltaher's passionate, informed, and fascinating account of this iconic woman, not a sound could be heard, so intent was the near-capacity audience of CFUW-Ottawa members and guests in catching his every word.

We were transported from a snowy January day in 2015 Ottawa to circa 1330 BC in ancient Egypt where the unconventional king, Akhenaten, and his queen Nefertiti, replaced many longestablished gods with a single supreme deity – the sun disc, Aten.

The implications of this new belief created a golden reign of Akhenaten and Nefertiti and their beloved family, but it may have led to the ultimate downfall of this once-golden couple.

Through Mr. Eltaher's eyes, we saw a beautiful, serene wife, mother, and queen, who was passionately loved by her husband, and who clearly had an influential and prominent role in royal rule and religious worship. And yet, after the early death of her husband after a rule of only 16 years, and her own early death, their unorthodox reign was expunged from Egypt's official records. (In the nineteenth century, their names reappeared with the decoding of hieroglyphic script.)

When we think of Nefertiti, it is the famous Nefertiti Bust (now in the Neues Museum in Berlin) that was unearthed in 1912 in Amarna, Egypt by German archaeologist Ludwig Borchardt, that forms our perception.

Mr. Eltaher's portrait of this intriguing woman left us all wanting to know more – surely a sign of an excellent presentation!

## The Impressive South African Association of Women Graduates (SAAWG)

The South African Association of Women Graduates (SAAWG) will host the next IFUW Triennial in Cape Town in 2016. When I visited Cape Town in October, I met some members of the Cape Town Branch. There is also a branch in Johannesburg as well as independent members residing in areas without a branch.

Hazel Brown, a former SAAWG President who is very active in the Cape Town Branch, arranged my meeting with several members. Those I met were diverse in age, colour, and background: a graduate student working on drug-resistant tuberculosis; an accountant recently arrived from Zimbabwe; two chemists (one a professor at the University of Cape Town and another working in a hospital laboratory); and a woman heading up an NGO that promotes education, particularly for girls in the townships. I learned much from them about the problems facing young South Africans, particularly women. They are actively engaged in addressing these.

The Cape Town Branch undertakes various activities throughout the year, including lectures and student awards. Since 2012, it has been conducting a mentoring program for disadvantaged women students. Initiated with a group of Grade 9 female students from four schools, the program is continuing with them through to Grade 12. Members conduct classes on one Saturday morning a month during the school term, hold a weekend event at the end of each year, and carry out an ongoing evaluation.

The national organization gives many undergraduate and postgraduate awards and fellowships and holds an annual symposium attended by both members and non-members. A recent theme was "Overcoming Barriers to Women in Leadership in Higher Education."

SAAWG commemorated its 90<sup>th</sup> anniversary by publishing a book: *Rights and Wrongs in This Land of Ours*. At its launch on Sept. 3, 2014, Naledi Pandor, Minister of Science and Technology, applauded SAAWG's "efforts in providing mentorship

support, outreach initiatives, and scholarships specifically focused on girl learners and women students." Her entire very inspiring speech is on the SAAWG website at <a href="https://www.saawg.org">www.saawg.org</a>.

I anticipate that SAAWG will host an outstanding Triennial in 2016 and encourage CFUW members to attend not only for the IFUW business sessions but to learn more about the work of SAAWG and the people of South Africa and to enjoy the outstanding beauty of Cape Town.

## **IFUW Proposed Name Change:**

### CFUW Seeks Input from All CFUW Members by Jan. 30, 2015

The International Federation of University Women (IFUW), of which CFUW is a National Federation Affiliate (NFA), is rebranding and restructuring to ensure its future viability. The IFUW Board is proposing to change the name of the organization to Graduate Women International (GWI), to convey an image of a group of graduate women united in a common purpose to empower girls and women everywhere through education. Under its current name, it is sometimes mistaken for a professional union of university staff or a university wives club. The IFUW Board believes that it needs to establish a new brand that is better understood and more memorable before marketing packages are prepared for the 2016 IFUW Triennial in Cape Town, South Africa. Starting with the 2016 conference, IFUW intends to evolve the Triennials into public conferences to attract a wider audience, to include leading educators and education donors, and to generate an alternative income stream.

The CFUW Board of Directors is asking all CFUW members to respond to a survey on the proposed name change **before Jan. 30** to provide them with clear direction on how to vote as an IFUW affiliate federation.

## FIRST GAWHARSHAD GRADS

The first cohort of ten Afghan girls sponsored by CFUW-Ottawa's University Women Helping Afghan Women Study and Interest Group (UWHAW) have graduated! On behalf of

the group, Mary Partington sent the following letter to each successful student:

"Congratulations to you for four years of hard work leading to your degree.

The challenges and rewards of your time at Gawharshad will be stored among your happiest memories – that is how we remember our university years.

Other women and girls will be inspired by you. Finding a useful place in the wider world will take time and great perseverance. Your country needs your skills and leadership to move forward.

We send our warmest wishes as you step into the future."

Preparing the next generation of competent and committed leaders to serve a modern government in Afghanistan is the goal of the Gawharshad Institute of Higher Education in Kabul from which "our" girls have graduated.

If human rights activist Dr. Sima Samar, who founded the Institute in 2010, has her way, and she usually does, many of these leaders will be women like our ten graduates empowered by knowledge of political science, law, economics,

business management, or civil engineering.

Some 31 percent of the 2,281 students who attend Gawharshad are highly motivated girls from poor families who

> pay lower tuition fees and often receive scholarships like the ones UWHAW has provided.

> Including girls in the student mix, which covers all regions and ethnicities, is paramount. Gawharshad has the highest percentage of female students in institutes of higher education in Afghanistan. Classes are mixed and human rights for all threaded through the curriculum.

To broaden the perspective of all students, a memo of understanding has been signed with the Sydney Institute of Technology to provide online training and technical help and an internship program has been set up to give students work experience to augment their chances for employment following graduation.

Gawharshad can't do it all and a new U.S. initiative called the Empowerment of Afghan Women with \$216 million in funding is a most welcome contribution to education for the scores of girls and women left behind when the Taliban closed schools.

## In Memoriam


#### Evelyn Lenore Noonan (née Tanton)




Our sincere condolences to the family and friends of former longtime CFUW-Ottawa member Evelyn Noonan who passed
