Alicia Natividad is a CFUW-Ottawa member and lawyer practising in the fields of business law, wills and estate planning, and real



property. Her presentation will discuss the implications of the recent Supreme Court of Canada judgement on physician-assisted suicide. On Feb. 6, 2015, the Court struck down the provision prohibiting assisted suicide in the *Criminal Code of Canada*, giving Canadian adults who are mentally competent and suffering intolerably the right to a doctor's help in dying. The decision is to take effect in 2016, to give the government time to amend its laws. The Court found that sections 241(b) and 14 of the *Criminal Code of Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms*.

# In Memoriam



# Dorothy I.M. Black 1914-2015

Our sincere condolences to the family and friends of Dorothy Black, an

active and longtime member of CFUW-Ottawa who passed away peacefully in her home on Sunday, April 12, 2015, after a brief illness, two weeks short of her 101<sup>st</sup> birthday.

Dorothy came to Ottawa in 1948 and taught for many years at Ottawa's now closed High School of Commerce in the 1960s and 70s. In 1979, the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation presented her with the first ever Smeaton-Muir Award for her contribution to the teaching profession in Ottawa. She became a member of CFUW-Ottawa in 1949, and contributed to many of our groups over the years. She travelled widely, was an expert bird watcher, and enjoyed a wide circle of friends and activities. She was a much-loved member of our Music Appreciation Group. She will be missed, but the example of her mental strength, as she fought her failing health to maintain her routines of living life to the fullest, can be an inspiration to us all.

In accordance with Dorothy's wishes, there will be no formal ceremony and she will be laid to rest with her parents in Park Lawn Cemetery in Toronto. Dorothy's obituary appeared in the *Ottawa Citizen* on Wednesday, April 15 and Thursday, April 16, 2015; in *The Globe and Mail* on Wednesday, April 15, 2015; and can be located online.





The annual meeting of the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women (UNCSW) is a forum for advocacy for girls and women, where decisions are made that affect girls and women worldwide. The theme of the 2015 meeting, held in New York City from March 9–20, was "Beijing+20", a focus on the challenges to gender equality and advancement of women 20 years after the adoption of the *Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action*.

As part of the 20-member CFUW delegation, we experienced an intense week of advocacy at the international level. We met and heard from women who are working tirelessly to make their world a better place. Women of the Ukraine and the Arab states seek peace and security. Heartbreaking presentations by our CFUW colleagues Linda MacDonald and Jeanne Sarson on femicide, and by Glenn Canning (father of Rehtaeh Parsons) on cyberbullying, made us acutely aware of work that needs to be done here at home, particularly in the area of improved legislation.

With a lens on Afghanistan, we attended a presentation by the Afghan Women's Network and a reception to which we were invited at the Permanent Mission of Afghanistan to the UN. The messages at both events were similar. Progress has been made in the political, health, education, and economic sectors. Laws to protect women have been made but they need to be implemented in a fair and transparent way. Women are not yet safe in Afghanistan, especially those who are working tirelessly and courageously to help themselves and generations to come. The remarkable Samira Hamidi from the Afghan Women's Network said that she and her colleagues were never safe

and never knew if they would be there the next day to carry on. She urged the continuing support of the international community and that we be their voice outside Afghanistan.

Advocacy at the international level is enhanced by networking and connections. At UNCSW, we attended meetings with our colleagues in the International Federation of University Women (IFUW). Our connection with IFUW is historic and it facilitates our work here at home. With the work of CFUW-Ottawa's University Women Helping Afghan Women (UWHAW) about to be posted on their website, IFUW gives us a continuing forum beyond our borders.

"The human race is like a bird with two wings. If one is broken, nobody can fly." (Mrs. Åsa Regnér, Swedish Minister for Children, the Elderly, and Gender Equality, and delegate to UNCSW59). We returned home from UNCSW ever mindful of our responsibility to support women who work against incredible odds to help themselves and generations to come.

# Simple Strategies to Build Resilience in Daily Life — Dr. Rachel Thibeault

On April 6, our guest speaker was Dr. Rachel Thibeault from the University of Ottawa Faculty of Health Sciences. Dr. Thibeault spent thirty-five years of her career specializing in Community-Based Rehabilitation, psychosocial care, and in studying the issues of meaning, resilience, and social justice in health care. Her research has taken her to hardto-access areas, often affected by HIV/AIDS, and to war zones and leprosy communities, in Southeast Asia, Central America, Europe, Africa, and the Middle East.

A powerfully moving speaker, Dr. Thibeault first discussed the meaning of resilience and cited relevant theorists. Having introduced the concept of "Post Traumatic Growth" that individuals develop as a result of surviving/experiencing trauma, she then reviewed the actions one must take to develop health and strength, explaining that resilience could be "trained" by spending as much time developing one's mental health as one's physical health.

Dr. Thibeault described six characteristics to cultivate resilience: Presence – mindfulness; Compassion – love and tenderness; Gratitude; Forgiveness; Justice; and Temperance – balance. She cited five strategies that we can apply in our daily lives: Centering; Contemplation – prayer or meditation; Creation; Contribution – caring and giving back; and Connectedness – to loved ones and to one's community.

In her introduction, Dr. Thibeault emphasized that these examples of resilience were not hers: they were based on her findings over the course of her work. One of her most touching stories, of a young mother in Sierra Leone mutilated during childbirth (and two months later, her baby mutilated by the same rebel), brought tears to our eyes. This young woman became a leader in her village, eventually living next door to the man who mutilated her and her baby. Her strategy for resilience: forgiveness.

The audience did not seem to want the presentation to end and had many thoughtful questions for Dr. Thibeault. She gave us much to think about, not the least of which is the chillingly high rate of depression among young people in our society today — linking it, in part, to their lack of sleep due to constant exposure to electronic devices.

# CFUW-Ottawa's First Honorary Member — Sue Holloway

When the CFUW-Ottawa Board undertook to update and review our membership rules back in 2013, they included a new membership category — that of "Honorary Member." Here's the text:

"An Honorary Membership may be granted by the Board of Directors to a woman who is not a CFUW-Ottawa member but who has made a significant contribution to CFUW, to the local Club, or to the development of society in ways consistent with the purposes of CFUW. She shall not hold office or have voting privileges. Honorary Membership is not transferable to another Club. An Honorary member shall not be required to pay dues."

CFUW-Ottawa has not been slow to take advantage of this new opportunity to appreciate and recognize women who have contributed to our community and who share our values and vision. We are thrilled to announce that at our AGM on May 5 we will welcome Sue Holloway of Ottawa as our first Honorary Member .

Sue is best known to us in her role as coach and mentor of the CFUW-Ottawa Dragonauts. She was the first Canadian to compete in both summer (sprint kayak) and winter (cross country ski) Olympics. She is an Olympic medalist, has worked with the Canadian Olympic committee, and has been inducted into the Canadian Olympic Hall of Fame. A graduate of Physical Education and Education, Sue is a motivational speaker and will be the keynote speaker at the CFUW Ontario Council AGM later this month.

It's that time of year again! Renew your 2015-16 membership either online or by mailing in your completed Registration Form (see <u>www.</u> <u>cfuw-ottawa.org/membership</u>). Membership renewal letters will be mailed in August to members who have not provided an email address.

Membership fees are the same as last year for full and student members: full membership is \$115, full-time university or college student membership is \$50. Dual membership is reduced to \$40.

# Big Changes Underway in Ontario Universities

The plenary session of Ontario Council's Standing Committees Meeting on March 14 focussed on the changes to post-secondary education underway in Ontario. Currently, Ontario has 24 colleges and 20 universities. In the future, 75 percent of all jobs will require a post-secondary degree or diploma.

Paddy Buckley, of the Ontario Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities explained that three years ago, Strategic Management Agreements (SMAs) were introduced, tied to operating grants and Ontario Student Assistance Program eligibility. They determine how schools will grow and specialize; they encourage training for economic growth and entrepreneurship.

Ontario's investment has led to unprecedented growth in interdisciplinary learning, including internships, online learning and Massive Open Online Courses; some 3,100 courses are available online.

Bonnie Patterson, of the Council of Ontario Universities, presented demographics as a major challenge. Currently, 80 percent of students entering universities are 18 - 20 years of age, a cohort expected to decline over the next decade. With decreasing correlation between student population numbers and growth estimates, institutions collaborate or compete for funding and are under increasing pressure to graduate students with specific skills required in the marketplace.

Anna Goldfinch of the Canadian Federation of Students-Ontario, informed us that Ontario's 300,000 post-secondary students pay the highest fees in Canada. Fees have increased by 108 percent in the past 10 years and library or lab fees have doubled or tripled. Few students today can earn enough money to pay for tuition, fees, books, and living expenses, and many students graduate with a Bachelor's degree and up to \$30,000 in student debts.

With declining student populations, universities hire fewer professors. Most instructors are now non-tenured sessional lecturers. Student-teacher ratios have risen from 17:1 to 28:1—the highest in the country. There are often 40 students in graduate seminars. (When I was in graduate school, seminars included 10 to 12 students!)

Ontario has 2,500 graduate students, most in programs such as MBAs, whose graduates are unlikely to remain in academia. Universities with SMAs will focus on research that can be corporatized, while the humanities and social sciences, compete for diminishing funds.

For over 40 years, funding has been based on "bums in seats". This year, the funding formula will be revisited. If you are an Ontario university graduate, this may be a good time to find out how your university is addressing these challenges.

# Title: Building a Voice for Women: One Club Charts a Route


