Dr. Adrian will discuss multiculturalism and how we have defined it. What does it really mean? How do we think about it?

Monday, March 4, at the Riverside Churches, the trustees of the CFUW-Ottawa's Scholarship Trust Fund (STF) welcomed Ottawa students, Club members and the public to our Scholarship Awards celebration, beginning with performances by the recipients of our music awards. Patricia O'Flaherty, Chair of the STF, introduced them.

Abigal Sanchez Rojas from Mexico, a second-year student from the Masters in Music program at the University of Ottawa and a repeat winner of the Barbara Newbegin Award in Music, played two piano pieces by Claude

Debussy—Pagodes and Jardins sous la pluie from Estampes.

Rachel Warkentin, in her second year of undergraduate studies in the Singer / Songwriter stream of the Music Program at Carleton University, and this year's winner of the Helen Nininger Scholarship in Music, sang her own composition, *Breathe*, accompanying herself on the piano.

Jessie Fleet, winner of the **Earl B. Connell Foundation Scholarship**, delighted us by playing *Pistache*, from *Les Épices* by Bernard Andrès, on the classical harp. Jessie, from a family of regularly

performing musicians, is a student in her fourth year of Undergraduate Studies in Music at Carleton University.

Our group of ladies is 80 in total although we usually have 50 to 60 members attending. We have booked six events this season and hope to be able to see a special exhibition in May or June. The Gallery gives us a list of events that we are able to attend as a group. I then choose the events that correspond to our calendar: a mix of

the permanent collection and the special, temporary exhibitions. So far this year, the *Paul Klee* and the *Anthropocene* exhibitions have been the ones most talked about.

Some of our members meet for the tours and then go for lunch after the tour. They also love to browse the Gallery's gift shop for special gifts.

Convenor of the Month: Dierdre Abernethy



Dierdre Abernethy has been the Convener of the National Gallery Study Group for three seasons. She never studied the history of art but is eager to make up for lost time. "Our guides as well as some of our members are treasure troves of art knowledge," she says. She has a member of the CFUW for seven years. Her neighbour, Norma Pike, initially took her to a meeting of University Women Helping Afghan Women and introduced her to the Literature Study Interest Group 1. Dierdre is still a stalwart member of both UWHAW and the book club.

Advocacy Survey

CFUW National asked for our feedback as to what we think are the top five most pressing issues which will appear on Party Platforms for the next Federal Election. They asked us to choose from a list of thirteen topics. At our General Meeting on February 4, we distributed a survey to get feedback from a sample of our members.

In total 38 responses were submitted. Aggregate totals are based on: 0 for Not important; 1 for Negligible importance; 2 for Important; 3 for Very Important; 4 for Extremely Important.

Lynne Bond tabulated the results, which are as follows:

- Women in Non-traditional Occupations: 23 responses.

- 5. Addressing Poverty: 30 responses. Aggregate total 92. Ranked #4
- 6. **Housing & Homelessness**: 34 responses. Aggregate total 113. **Ranked #1**
- 7. Universal Pharmacare: 24 responses. Aggregate total 64
- 8. Environment & Climate Change: 31 responses. Aggregate total 102. Ranked #3
- 9. Elections & Electoral Reform: 24 responses. Aggregate total 41
- Missing & Murdered Indigenous Women: 28 responses.
 Aggregate total 76
- 11. **Education for Indigenous Youth**: 31 responses. Aggregate total 103. **Ranked #2**
- 12. Immigration: 32 responses. Aggregate total 86. Ranked #5
- 13. Gender Violence: 27 responses. Aggregate total 78

For many people, **Mental Health** was a recommended addition to the list.

International Women's Day Cabaret

For a change of atmosphere, Ottawa musician and composer Anita Pari then mesmerized us at the piano with her interpretations of Franz Schubert's *Impromptu* Op. 90 Nos. 2 and 3, and Frédéric Chopin's *Nocturne*, Op. 9 No. 2. Our Club is

In Memoriam: Ann Denis

Ann Denis made her mark on so many activities of the Canadian Federation of University Women that we are still reeling from her sudden

death in February and trying to pick up the pieces of the projects she left behind.

Ann was a new member of the CFUW Charitable Trust Fellowships committee who read and evaluate proposals for about \$140,000 in scholarships given each year by our national organization. Ann was in the middle of this year's project. For several years, she worked with the Issues and Advocacy group of CFUW-Ottawa, using her research skills to help define and clarify resolutions. This year she had begun working with the Focus on GWI study group to create the program for the Empowerment Through Education seminar that takes place on April 13, 2019. She had visited Global Affairs Canada and World University Service Canada (WUSC) and had arranged a partnership between CFUW-Ottawa and WUSC in preparation for this seminar.

Ann was also the convenor of our Literature Study Group 3 in CFUW-Ottawa, often inviting the group to meet at her home, and in February, a week after her death, was to have presented and recommended *Brother*, by David Chariandy. We would have loved to hear her take on this book, of which she was particularly fond, now one of CBC's Canada Reads titles and the

winner of a major prize. An inveterate walker, she usually refused rides to our meetings, but would often accept a ride home, talking to me about her projects and plans.

She had arranged to attend the Commission on the Status of Women meetings at the United Nations in New York this March. She usually made that trip by bus each year, representing the Canadian Research Institute for the Advancement of Women (CRIAW). Ann was always generous in sharing her impressions of the CSW meetings and what she had learned from them. She had not yet decided about whether to attend the Graduate Women International Triennial in Geneva (July 2019) or the CFUW AGM in Winnipeg (August 2019), or both.

Ann's knowledge of issues surrounding women's education was extensive. After graduating from Carleton University she earned her PhD in Sociology from the London School of Economics in 1969. From 1973 she was professor at the School of Sociological and Anthropological Studies at the University of Ottawa, teaching in both English and French, and sometimes acting as chair of the school. Her research over many years contributed to the understanding of interrelations between gender, ethnicity/race, and class. She was renowned for her research and publications. At the University of Ottawa she established the university's research ethics committee, and was devoted to her students, serving on many dissertation examination committees throughout Canada. On her retirement in 2009, the University recognized Ann's contributions, naming her *Professor Emerita*. In 2013 the Ottawa International Women's Week group awarded her their Femmy Award for "Outstanding Contributions to the Struggle for Women's Equality in the National Capital Region."

Ann was married in 1979 to Greg Belkov who died in 1992. She was an active supporter of Ottawa theatre including the Ottawa Little Theatre, the Company of Fools, the Great Canadian Theatre Company and the National Arts Centre. Ann's friendly, easy going, manner and her ability and desire to get into in-depth conversations, made her a delight to be with. Her CFUW-Ottawa colleagues miss her enormously.

A Raffle for GWI



In honour of CFUW's 100th Anniversary, we are pleased to announce an opportunity for you to own a unique, extraordinary piece of history. Our National VP Finance, Dominique Racanelli, discovered two beautiful blue enamel pins, created in 1924 for the third IFUW International Conference in Christiania (now Oslo), Norway, held Monday July 28 to Friday August 1 of that year. The Revenue Generating Committee of CFUW-National is making them available to the membership in a fair way, through a draw. In the 100th Year of both CFUW & GWI, For a \$10 contribution, you have two chances to own one of these lovely pins. All proceeds will be directed to GWI to help pay for the unpaid GWI balance. In other words, participation in the raffle is a gesture of support for GWI.

This original design by Norwegian jeweler, David Andersen, shows an antique silver lamp, representing the light of learning, on a blue background broken with the letters IFUW in silver. Around the central disc is an interlinked chain to symbolize the bonds of friendship linking IFUW members throughout the world. The pins are silver backed and bear the numbers 190 and 163.

Our foremothers had come out of a devastating World War, dedicated to the advancement of women, with a determination to bring educated women together to turn the fight into one for peace. The name IFUW was not intended to describe a group of women who had graduated from universities. It was rather meant to be symbolic: to open the gates of universities to women so they would not be exclusively for men to enter. In other words, it was a symbol of gender equality in education. Thus began IFUW's work, and today we continue to facilitate women's opportunities for education at the highest levels.

All it will take for you to possess one of these delightful treasures is a minimum

contribution of \$10, allowing you two chances to win one of these historic pins. *For every \$10 contribution you submit, you get another two chances to win.* You will have an opportunity to participate in this draw at our meetings on April 1st and May 4th.

The draw will take place before the GWI Triennial in July 2019 and the two winners will be announced on July 28, 2019, in Geneva, Switzerland.
