We have managed to secure the Delta Hotel downtown, a lovely venue both for us and our out-of-town guests. We shall need many volunteers, so don't be surprised if you are approached for help.

In the shorter term, on March 4th at the Riverside Churches, 7:30 p.m., we are hosting our annual *Scholarship Trust Awards Evening*. By supporting various CFUW-Ottawa events, you

have financed these awards, so please come to see them handed out. Also in March is our International Women's Day event, the **CABARET**: see the poster on page 5 of this newsletter. This will take place the afternoon of Saturday, March 9th, also at the Riverside Churches—a celebration indeed, not to be missed. I really wanted this event to be fun and feel confident it will be.

Not only will April bring our General Meeting on April 2nd with speaker Melanie Adrian (free and open to the public), but there are two ticketed events: the Seminar on International Issues: *Inclusion and Empowerment through Education*, at Ottawa City Hall on Saturday, April 13th (see page 8) and the popular *Musical Lunch and Silent Auction* on Saturday, April 25th (see page 10).

Now for the bad news. Inflation is affecting everything, and the CFUW-Ottawa Board has decided there is a need to increase the dues for the 2019-2020 year from \$115 to \$120. At the last May CFUW-Ottawa AGM, members gave the Board authorization to raise the fees by up to \$11 for inflationary issues for GWI and CFUW. (You can see the draft minutes for this meeting on our website.) The National AGM of 2017 ran out of time before a vote on a dues increase could be called. At the National AGM of 2018, a vote on a dues increase was narrowly defeated. We have little doubt that a motion for a dues increase will pass at the 2019 National AGM in Winnipeg. GWI dues have increased by the equivalent of \$8.40. Considering these factors, your Ottawa Board agreed that it was prudent to raise our dues by \$5.

This increase will not affect the membership fees for current members until next September's annual renewal. New members enrolling in February 2019 will have the benefit of dues paid now (\$120), covering membership until

September 2020! I encourage members to alert friends who might be considering joining about this opportunity. I call February the BARGAIN month for NEW members. The fees for student members are even a bigger bargain, remaining at \$50.

As much as you can, please take full advantage of your membership. There are many meetings, members, events and interest groups. In fact, stay tuned for more new interest groups in the near future.

A Food Revolution In Yellowknife

France Benoit

At our General Meeting on February 4, a light lunch was followed by an inspiring presentation by France Benoit, farmer, documentary film maker and commu-

nity activist, whose mission is to "change the world, one carrot at a time".

Having begun with a small garden growing vegetables for personal consumption in Yellowknife, France's passion for gardening evolved into an inspired project to launch the Yellowknife Farmers' Market and a just and sustainable Food Charter, the first agriculture strategy for the City of Yellowknife and the NWT Government.

France began with a small greenhouse and some raised beds on her property; she also used every available space in her home for container planting. Later, she diversified her crops by creating a microclimate for certain vegetables. She took a cheese making course using pasteurized milk simply purchased from her grocery

store and launched a new line of products to sell at the Farmers' Market: desserts and baked goods made with her own cheese and vegetables.

France explained how the group who created the Market planned strategically, for example deciding to host the Market immediately after work on a weekday, so as to capture the interest of workers on their way home. The Market is held on City Hall grounds and the city funds children's activities, leaving their parents free to shop. The rules of the Market reflect the volunteers' values:

- Only sell locally produced, baked, processed or harvested produce
- Use only compostable packaging
- No plastic bottles
- Increase the volume of local produce through community initiatives
- Support lower-income young families and promote healthy eating by demonstrating how to prepare meals from local produce
- Promote composting, with volunteers explaining the proper disposal of containers, utensils, left-overs and garbage

France described the many challenges she faces, farming "North of 60", and her creative solutions to these problems:

- Copious watering to deal with a short, intense growing season with 18 hours of daylight
- Strategically located, small, unheated greenhouses
- Making soil by means of *lasagne* gardening: different layers of organic waste covered and composted over time
- Electrified fences around the food beds to deter wild animals
- Raised beds on uneven ground with one crop on the low end and another at the high end
- Laying rocks in a circle so they can create a space to grow food
- Growing the same crop in different areas so that pests will not destroy the whole crop

France kindly answered the many questions that followed her talk.

At this meeting, the book sale was once again an attraction, and we thank Kevser Korhan Taymaz for organizing the excellent lunch.



At The Parkdale Food Centre

"At the Parkdale Food Centre, we believe in an Ottawa where everyone has the means and opportunity to live a healthy, connected, and fulfilling life."

This year, in addition to exploring recipes from different countries, CFUW-Ottawa's International Cuisine Group II chose a community outing as one of our events. In January, we took our talents to the superb kitchen of the Parkdale Food Centre, to help prepare food for programs offered by the Centre. Dishes included beef lasagna and mac-and-cheese for a local After School Club. Both dishes would feed 24 hungry children, with leftovers to take home for their siblings. A large cauldron of beef stew simmered on top of the stove; after it cooled, 50 family size containers of stew were packaged and placed in the freezer as part of the Fill the Freezer Program, to help families coming in for food. Last, but not least, we baked several dozen blueberry muffins, so that clients could be offered a treat along with a welcoming cup of coffee.

A small, dedicated staff keeps the innovative Centre accessible to the neighbourhood. Community partnerships and a large base of volunteers are essential to its success. Manager Karen Secord stresses that the Centre emphasizes community, innovative strategies for success and, above all, respect for its clients. They hand

out only nutritious food, including hydroponic lettuce grown at the Centre. They feature communal meals where everyone cooks under the direction of a chef and eats at the big table. Some clients have no access to stoves, so the centre teaches cooking in crock pots which are given to those who attend these classes. The CFUW group, having paid for the food they prepared, used recipes from Sherri Ryan, the organizer of this event. We left knowing we would be back.

Dawn's interest in cooking started at an early age, helping her mother baking. Cooking has turned into a lifelong interest,

one that she enjoys sharing with members of the International Cuisine Group II.

Do you know who we are?

CFUW Scholarships

CFUW-Ottawa and most other CFUW clubs as well as CFUW National give scholarships and/or fellowships to qualifying post-secondary students (preferably female) across Canada:

- In 2019 CFUW-Ottawa Scholarship Trust Fund will give 24 scholarships totaling \$45,500 to students at Carleton, University of Ottawa and Algonquin College
- In 2019 the CFUW Charitable Trust will give 20 scholarships and fellowships to students across Canada, totaling \$141,000
- In 2016-17 a survey by the CFUW Charitable Trust showed that over \$1.1 million in scholarships and fellowships are given to Canadian students by clubs across Canada.

The CFUW-Ottawa External Outreach Group University Women Helping Afghan Women (UWHAW) raises funds for scholarships for women to attend the Gawharshad Institute of Higher Education in Kabul. Since 2011 UWHAW has raised over \$125,000. 36 scholarship winners have already graduated and 38 are still in their program.

Graduate Women International (GWI) gives several fellowships, grants and other awards to qualifying students around the world. Funding for these awards is based on donations from GWI affiliates and individual members around the world. Like CFUW, many other national affiliates of GWI also have scholarship programs.

Hanneke's Bridge Lunch

The purpose of the bridge lunch fundraiser we held on January 9th was to raise money for scholarships for young Afghan women to study at the Gawharshad Institute of Higher Learning, a cause we have worked for since 2010. Participants arrived at 11:30 for a drink, had lunch at 12—Afghan *Qabli pilau* and a dessert of *crême caramel*, made in my tiny kitchen—and started playing at 1, at four tables. We had prizes for certain contracts made; if

the next person made the same contract, those prizes could be stolen, causing much hilarity and rivalry. At the end, prizes were awarded for the highest and lowest score. With a suggested ticket price of \$40, we raised \$820, more than enough for one girl to go to Gawharshad institute for one year.

We shall do this again. It was fun, and the idea that someone will benefit so directly from our efforts is rewarding!

Did you know...?

The Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada's Calls for Action document, issued four years ago, contains elements directed to education ministries in provinces and territories. One such element calls for the implementation of a mandatory Kindergarten to Grade 12 curriculum to teach children and youth about residential schools, treaties and aboriginal peoples' historical and contemporary contributions to Canada. The **Exploring Indigenous Education** group is examining the extent to which the Province of Ontario is responding to this call to action.
