## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

hope your year started well. Our 📘 January speaker, Michelle Valberg, was stellar and literally took our breath away with her photographs.

My own January had a whirlwind start. Some of you may remember that at the great Holiday Party we had on December 3<sup>rd</sup>, I played the role of the Page to Good King Wenceslas. Less than a fortnight later, I was faced with the prospect of a different role. What happened? Charlotte Rigby sent a memo to the Board members indicating that she was resigning as President of CFUW-Ottawa effective December 31 of last year. She is well. She just wants, needs and deserves a break after serving for more than three years in the position. We thank her for that service. She will still be working on the preparations for the International Women's Day celebration this year. According to the Club by laws, the Board must ensure that, if the President resigns, the office is filled by appointing a full Board member to fill the unexpired term. The Board met on December 12 and voted to appoint me as Interim President effective January 1st of this year. I will serve in that capacity until Club elections are held at the Annual General Meeting in May. There are many talented people on the Board and I will depend on their support and yours.

You will recall that that you received in your email a forwarded copy of a CFUW-National Update of December 8. It invited members who wished to do so to make a voluntary contribution of \$8.40 to cover the required dues increase for Graduate Women International (GWI). The Ottawa Board discussed the update on December 12. Although the Ottawa

club supports GWI, our Board concluded that this proposal was not workable for us and it is too divisive within the Clubs both locally and nationally. I wrote to National President, Grace Hollett, requesting that the National Board form another more feasible plan to meet the GWI dues increase. We are by no means the only club to have decided not to recommend to our members this plan of voluntary contributions of \$8.40 for the GWI dues increase. CFUW-National has not yet proposed another way forward.

CFUW-Ottawa has always been a Club with a focus on advocacy. This year is no exception. A major advocacy theme for the year has been Women and Poverty. Lynne Bond and I chaired a Resolutions and Advocacy Group meeting on November 9th. Our guest speaker was Ann Denis, who is a specialist on

Further consultation with the National Board and with the Ottawa Board led us to conclude that proposing a National Advocacy Campaign on the topic would be more effective. The Resolutions and Advocacy Group is working on the development of this campaign and the consideration of the Resolutions to National submitted by other Clubs. At the April General Meeting, we will bring forth to the club our recommendations.

This Club is not just talk about women and poverty either. The letter from the *Elizabeth Fry Society* in this issue of the Carillon indicates how significant our contribution level has been this year. Many our members are also contributing actively to the support of *Cornerstone* too. You deserve to be proud of what you do.

## Welcome to our Interim CFUW-Ottawa President Heather Lewis



Heather Lewis became our new President January 1, 2018. So who is Heather Lewis?

Heather has a long association

with CFUW, starting when she was a graduate student at the University of Toronto. She let her membership lapse as she went on to a distinguished academic career in English Literature, History and Religious Studies while obtaining a PhD from McGill. She taught at the post-secondary level in Quebec and became a Dean at Vanier College in Montreal. She then moved

to Victoria B.C. to become Dean of Arts and Science at Camosun College.

Upon Heather's retirement in 2008, she joined CFUW-Victoria. where she served in several capacities on the Victoria Executive. When she moved with her husband to Ottawa in 2015 to be closer to her daughter and grandsons, she joined our club. She participated in the CFUW-Ottawa Board as Secretary and then VP Liaison. She has an interest in Advocacy and she is currently a member of the History Group, Historical Fiction Group, MADRIGALS, and the Tuesday luncheon Group. She has also attended five CFUW-National AGMs.

Retiring from TELUS in 2010, Janet transferred 25 years of corporate knowledge and skills successfully into the not-for-profit sector. Currently Janet chairs the Arthritis Alliance of Canada, Past-Chair of the Ontario Trillium Foundation, and serves on the boards of Samara and the Ottawa Art Gallery. Janet is a recipient of the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal. She is also a marathon runner and mother.

The Arthritis Society is a national health charity fueled by donors and volunteers, with a vision to live in a world where people are free from the devastating effects that arthritis has on lives. Janet is responsible for leading the organization in their mission of helping people live well with arthritis while searching for a cure. The Arthritis Society funds life-altering research, develops and implements educational and service programing both in

person and on-line, leads advocacy work to drive meaningful policy change and executes awareness programs so that people are aware of the toll of arthritis and what can be done to alleviate their pain.

Janet leads a corporate organization, with regional offices across the country providing local programs and resources to people living with arthritis, She will be accompanied by **Catherine Harwood**, the Regional Development Manager of Eastern Ontario. The Ottawa Regional office provides information regarding education, physiotherapy, occupational therapy, social work support, individual assessments and services and educational groups for people with osteoarthritis, inflammatory arthritis and fibromyalgia.

Catherine and Janet will be accompanied by their clinician and are promising a very engaging presentation with answers to our many questions.

## Michelle Valberg: Creativity in Motion



Despite the extreme cold, over one hundred CFUW-Ottawa members and guests attended the presentation of Michelle Valberg at the

January 8<sup>th</sup> General Meeting. A professional photographer, renowned explorer and adventurer, Michelle held us all spellbound. You had to be there to experience it.

Michelle shared her adventures and showed us the magic images of Northern landscapes, wildlife, and people. She described the many daring ways required to capture that special image of a herd of narwhals, or of a close-up of a polar bear. She illustrated the need of being always aware of the environment and thus avoiding life endangering situations posed by the wild creatures, and extreme

and shifting weather and ice conditions. She spoke about the perseverance needed to wait for something to happen, for something to appear and then seizing the opportunity to capture the moment with the camera. A successful shoot also depends upon teamwork with guides and other photographers.

Be it swimming with humpback whales at Silver Banks in the Dominican Republic, portraying the Spirit Bears in BC, Grizzly Bears at Bear Cave Mountain in the Yukon or Beluga Whales and other wildlife in the Arctic, Michelle's courage, enthusiasm and artistic dedication shone through in her words and in her photography. Examples of her art can be found in her self-published books: **Look Beyond** ... The Faces & Stories of People Living with HIV/AIDS, **Dare to Dream**... A Celebration of

Canadian Women, Arctic Kaleidoscope... The People, Wildlife and Ever-Changing Landscape. She also produced a children's book, Ben & Nuki Discover Polar Bears.

It was also good to see the happy and proud faces of the people and children who are benefitting from **Project North**, a not-for-profit organization founded by Ms. Valberg and which is committed to delivering education and sport-based opportunities to youth in Canada's Arctic. Since its inception, \$1,000,000 worth in new sports equipment has been delivered to more than 26 Inuit communities.

As Michelle's birthday coincided with our General Meeting day, the audience broke into a hearty choir of "Happy Birthday" at the end of the presentation.

CFUW-Ottawa sadly notes the passing of two former long-time members: **Melita Classen** (1928 – 2017) and **Alison Brunton** (1923 – 2017)

Melita Classen was active in the CFUW-Ottawa's Diplomatic Hospitality Group (DHG), often extending the warmth of her welcome to diplomats and their families and offering people rides to DHG events. A fluent and dedicated member of the DHG's German conversation group, she came to its weekly meetings for two decades, often encouraging the group to sing, as well as speak, in German. She was a treasured participant in French conversation groups. She took part in the bridge groups and the Madrigals. Melita was known as a remarkable raconteuse, as well as being a gifted accompanist. Her friend Alison Hobbs tells us that Melita was a loyal, intelligent friend, who would lend a sympathetic ear to anyone who wanted to talk to her about their troubles; she was sensitive to the dark side of life, willing to offer

pertinent advice, and who, at less solemn moments, endeared herself to others with her infectious laughter.

Alison Brunton was known in CFUW for her love of French literature and culture. Her friend Ruby Elver tells us that as a retired French teacher at Confederation High School in Nepean, Alison was a valued member of Charline Alward's CFUW French Conversion Group, which met for many years in each other's homes for a snack and for discussion of French books. The first in her family to achieve a university education, she was blessed with wisdom, kindness, determination, graciousness and charm, and a dry sense of humour. She continued to be devoted to family and friends even as the ravages of age took hold.


