Mr. Heinbecker graduated from Waterloo Lutheran University with a BA (Hons) and has received honorary doctorates from Wilfred Laurier and St. Thomas Universities. He is a distinguished



retired Canadian career diplomat, a former Canadian ambassador to Germany, and a permanent representative of Canada to the United Nations (UN). At the UN, he was a leading opponent of the Iraq war and an advocate of the International Criminal Court and the Responsibility to Protect. Mr. Heinbecker held the position of Minister

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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

How much has happened to our organizations and our country in the past four months! Many of us have worked on policy resolutions and action plans and it's wonderful to see progress on some CFUW priority issues including the mandatory national census; the national action plan on violence against women; national framework on child care; new commitments to address climate change; and more.

Closer to home, with partners CFUW-Nepean, CFUW/Kanata, and the Ottawa Council of Women, our ever-popular International Women's Day celebration will be on Tuesday, March 8. This year's theme is "Moving Forward - One Step at a Time". We'll include a silent auction and our club's share of the revenue will support new and continuing CFUW-Ottawa Scholarships for women studying at the University of Ottawa, Carleton University, Algonquin College, and La Cité collégiale, as part of CFUW's National Centennial celebrations in 2019. You will find details in this issue. Save the date!

Our General Meeting on Feb. 1 will begin with a dynamic speaker, Paul Heinbecker, followed by our annual "Resolutions" Meeting. Members of our Issues Groups, who have been reviewing the five draft resolutions submitted for CFUW's National Annual General Meeting in June, will present their recommendations for your approval. This is our chance to express our opinions and contribute to sound CFUW policies and advocacy plans. And I've been reliably informed that our session will close with surprise treats – possibly involving chocolate.

Our CFUW community extends far beyond our borders. CFUW-Ottawa members are automatically members of CFUW National and also of Graduate Women International (GWI - formerly IFUW) (See www.cfuw.ca/en-ca/ aboutus/ifuw-gwi/ifuw-gwigoingforward. aspx). Our connection with GWI has always been close; CFUW was a founding member of GWI in 1919 (the same year that CFUW itself was founded!) and we are the largest of about 60 National Federations and Associations (NFAs). GWI Headquarters is in Geneva. Therefore, NFA membership dues, its only source of financial support, must be paid in expensive Swiss francs. Some NFAs are having financial difficulties paying their dues, and some are expressing doubts that GWI's value on the world scene justifies its cost. Two of the largest NFAs, Germany and the Netherlands, have recently withdrawn, citing financial concerns and their need to focus on

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domestic issues. CFUW has launched a website (www.cfuwforum.org) to host discussion about the benefits, costs, and rationale for CFUW to remain a GWI member. GWI may not survive without CFUW. I encourage you to join this important discussion. Many of our fellow CFUW-Ottawa members have formed Friends for the GWI (FFGWI) and are working with other CFUW members across Canada to study the situation, gather information, and express their opinions. Join the conversation online or contact Dorothy Phillips of FFGWI at dorothy@ashidor.ca.

We lost a devoted, distinguished, and highly respected member when Ruth Bell passed away shortly before Christmas. Ruth's contributions to CFUW-Ottawa, to CFUW nationally, and to women's well-being internationally, were immeasurable. We've all benefited immensely from her generosity and commitment. Ruth was a major donor to our Scholarship Trust Fund, and is especially remembered for the CFUW-Ottawa Centennial Scholarships in 2010. We remember her with affection and gratitude. She truly made the world a better place.

(Political Affairs) at the Canadian Embassy in Washington, other positions in Ankara, Stockholm, and at the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) in Paris.

Mr. Heinbecker has been Chief Foreign Policy Advisor to Prime Minister Brian Mulroney, Assistant Secretary to the Cabinet for Foreign and Defence Policy, and Assistant Deputy Minister for International Security and Global Affairs in the Department of External/Foreign Affairs. He has been credited as an architect of Canada's human security agenda.

He is one of Canada's most experienced commentators on foreign policy and international governance. He has also written numerous newspaper and journal articles, authored *Getting Back in the Game: A Foreign Policy Playbook for Canada*, and has contributed to and edited several other books on international relations.

Advocacy has long been a central pillar of the Canadian Federation of University Women. Our advocacy is based on CFUW policy which in turn is based on resolutions. Resolutions are developed by CFUW Clubs either individually or by co-operation between Clubs. This year, four resolutions have been presented for review by six Clubs and one resolution by the CFUW Standing Committees on Advocacy, International Relations, and Education.

The five resolutions are:

- Strengthening the Pest Management Regulatory Agency in Order to Protect the Environment proposed by CFUW Owen Sound and Area
- 4. Electoral Reform: Adding
 Proportionality to the Electoral
 System in Canada proposed by
 CFUW Leaside-East York and CFUW
 Etobicoke
- Sustainable Development Goals
 proposed by the CFUW Standing
 Committees on Advocacy, International
 Relations, and Education

At our general meeting on Monday, Feb. 1, following Paul Heinbecker's presentation, we will introduce the five resolutions to our members with any edits or changes suggested by the CFUW-Ottawa Environmental Toxins and Health Group (proposed resolutions 2 & 3) and the Issues and Advocacy Group (proposed resolutions 1, 4 & 5). Each resolution will be presented by a member of the reviewing Group who will briefly summarize it, outline the background, identify any recommended changes, open discussion / Q&A to the floor, and call a vote to accept or reject the resolution. The VP Liaison will then forward any edits, comments, and the results of the vote to the proposing Club(s) or Committee(s). Then, with the caveat that she may change her vote based on further changes to the resolution introduced prior to the AGM, the new CFUW President will attend the CFUW AGM in St. Catharines and speak to the resolutions as she deems fit and vote on them according to the results of the CFUW-Ottawa meeting on Feb. 1.

Although this sounds somewhat complicated, the activity should be complete within 40 minutes. Following the business part of the meeting, we hope to have a special treat for our members. February is the month for Valentines and one naturally thinks of chocolate!! Looking forward to seeing you then.

Women and Dementia: Incidence, Impact, and Potential for Prevention

Dr. Antoine Hakim spoke on women and dementia to a full crowd at the CFUW-Ottawa luncheon meeting on Jan. 11, 2015. Not surprisingly, 70 percent of dementia patients are women. Women in their 60s are twice as likely to develop dementia over the rest of their lives than breast cancer.

What is dementia? According to Dr. Hakim, dementia is "an umbrella term describing a serious deterioration in mental functions, such as memory, language, orientation, and judgement". There are many types of dementia. The best-known is Alzheimer's disease which accounts for two-thirds of cases. Unfortunately, there is no cure for any type of dementia. Drugs may ease some

of the symptoms but they do not tackle the underlying diseases.

What causes dementia? Dr. Hakim pointed out that there are certain brain conditions that can cause dementia: Alzheimer's disease, brain vascular disease, neurodegenerative diseases such as Parkinson's disease, multiple sclerosis, frontotemporal dementia, and normal pressure hydrocephalus.

Dr. Hakim noted the research of Deborah Barnes in Lancet Neurology, 2011, that identified certain factors that contribute to dementia. They are low education, smoking, physical inactivity, depression, hypertension, diabetes, and obesity. In North America, physical inactivity is the highest contributing

factor followed by depression, smoking, hypertension, low education, obesity, and diabetes, in that order.

According to Dr. Hakim, we control a major part of how we age. We can keep dementia at bay by taking preventive measures that we can do ourselves to combat the contributing factors that lead to dementia; essentially, having and enjoying a healthy lifestyle, stimulating our minds, and joining associations such as CFUW.

Dr. Hakim has written a book to be published in French detailing his research on dementia which will be launched in March. The publication of the English version is still in the works.

Kicking in for Kids — Together we've made a difference!

A very special fundraising event took place at Ben Franklin Place on Nov. 25, 2015: two eminent Canadian authors, Charlotte Gray and Jane Urguhart, were the stars of a fundraiser for Kick in for Kids, a community group in the Rideau Lakes area that raises funds to help students in the local high school, Rideau District High School (RDHS). CFUW-Ottawa partnered with Kick in for Kids to make this event happen.

The theme of the evening was 'Taste of the Rideau' and so it was, figuratively and literally, with Wendy's Country Market from Lyndhurst catering the reception and Kick in for Kids coming up with some great Rideau Lakes-related door, raffle, sale, and auction items, including boat, garden, and organic cheese factory tours. (In fact, if you're interested in a June 2016 boat trip from Chaffey's Lock to Jones Falls with lunch at Hotel Kenney, tickets will be available at our International Women's Day event at Centrepointe on March 8.)

Sharon Halladay, RDHS principal, spoke simply and directly to the needs of her students, and to the plight of the School's community: caring and close but suffering from fewer and fewer jobs. She explained the paper outline of a small foot she had with her as one of the ways in which the financial help from Kick in for Kids helps her students. She had the foot outline so she could buy a pair of shoes the next day for a Grade 7 student who had one pair of shoes - no laces, no toes. He had finally found friends to play soccer with, but no one wanted to play with him as every time he kicked the ball, his

shoe flew off, invariably hitting one of his new-found friends.

Yvonne Helwig, Kick in for Kids, introduced the talented and popular writers, Charlotte Gray and Jane Urquhart. In a matter of seconds, Charlotte and Jane turned the stage into a dock on Newboro Lake on a summer's day, their drink-

ing water into white wine, and shared their conversation on Fiction and Nonfiction: Why We Do It, with an expectant, appreciative, and sold out crowd.

At ease with each other, the topic and the audience, Charlotte and Jane held forth in a friendly, humorous manner on many topics: experiences gained in university, first jobs, reactions and comments from readers, the need for rigorous research, and never knowing where their writing was going to end up - even with nonfiction!

All too soon their

conversation ended. They graciously fielded questions from the audience. I thanked the authors and presented them with bouquets of flowers donated by Tivoli Flowers - a small token of appreciation for their generous contribution to Kick in for Kids.

Other members of Kick in for Kids closed the program: Maggie Fleming spoke about the origins in 2014 of this small group, committed to helping local students participate and thrive in their schooling. Diane Haskins thanked CFUW-Ottawa for our work in making this fundraiser such a success, for its efficiency and generosity. And little did she know at the time how much of a financial success this fundraiser was! The final figures are quite amazing.

A Plea for Support for a Fine Institution in Kandahar

At the meeting of University Women Helping Afghan Women (UWHAW) on

Jan. 7, 2016, our speaker, Maryam Sahar Naqibullah, requested our support for her former school, the Afghan-Canadian Community Centre (ACCC) in Kandahar.

Maryam came from an illiterate family in Afghanistan, and was educated at the ACCC. Within two years, at age 16, she was sufficiently proficient in English to become an interpreter for the Canadian Forces. She was brought to

Canada for her own protection, and is pursuing a PhD with a double major in International Relations and Security at Carleton University while also acting as an advisor to the Department of National Defence (DND) in training the police and military in Afghanistan. She hopes to return to Afghanistan in the future.

The ACCC has a stellar record. Begun in 2006 with funding from the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) and individual donors, it is now the largest community learning institution in southern Afghanistan. Both its technologically savvy staff and support from Afghans and international volunteers — many Canadians and Americans, including ex-military personnel — have enabled its outstanding reputation. It has a connection with the Southern Alberta Institute of Technology (SAIT), teaching computer skills and business management, as well as English. Though more boys than girls attend, from an amazing age range of six to 40, it offers a wonderful opportunity for girls to get an education and a job after graduation. With the status such an education brings, these girls get a chance for an increased role in the family, the community, and society. Three thousand women have attended, 700 have graduated with jobs after graduation, thus getting a chance to make their own individual decisions — such a rarity for women in

Afghanistan. One hundred and eighty have received scholarships to go on to further education.

Canada has ceased to fund ACCC and it is in danger of closing if sufficient funds are not forthcoming. Maryam and fellow advocates have managed to raise \$17,000 of the \$20,000 needed to keep it operating for two months. But of course, a longer term solution is needed. We are invited to write to our Members of

Parliament to encourage our government to use \$5 million of the \$50 million the country has promised to Afghan projects following the withdrawal of our troops, to support this school which has developed so many leaders and successful citizens. We may do this as individuals, while our President, Charlotte Rigby, has done so on behalf of CFUW-Ottawa.

Maryam has received support from her MP David McGuinty, from Hon. Marie-Claude Bibeau, Minister of International Development and La Francophonie, General and MP Andrew Leslie, and Hon. Maryam Monsef, an Afghan-Canadian in the new cabinet as Minister of Democratic Institutions. The government will be deciding on the disbursement of monies for Afghanistan by the end of January.

At our meeting, Fran Harding produced paper, envelopes, details of the school, and salient points to be made to our MPs and other related politicians. Some sat at tables and wrote directly to their MPs, while many more took the literature to do the work at home. It was a masterful combination of rhetoric with the actual tools needed to create support for a worthy cause. *Brave*, Maryam and Fran!

In Memoriam

Dr. Ruth Marion Bell (née Cooper), C.M., BA, MA, LL.D., DSL (Hon. Causa), 39th CFUW-Ottawa President, 1968-70, 19th CFUW President, 1973-76 1919-2015



Our sincere condolences to the family and friends of Dr. Ruth Bell, longtime active member of CFUW-Ottawa, who passed away peacefully on Wednesday, Dec.

16, 2015, at age 96, at the Ottawa Civic Hospital. Ruth will be missed by her many friends in CFUW-Ottawa and is remembered affectionately for her feistiness, enthusiasm for life, sense of humour, and love of music. Highly respected, Ruth was honoured by CFUW-Ottawa with a life membership in 2007.

She joined CFUW-Ottawa in 1955 and was active in many capacities over the years, holding executive positions at the local, national, and international levels of the organization. In 1968, she spearheaded the Diplomatic Hospitality Service Group, co-founded with Elizabeth Doe. During her CFUW Presidency, she initiated the "Foster the Roster" campaign to appoint qualified women to corporate boards and directorships. Most recently, she was Honorary Convenor of the Economic Realities for Women Study and Interest Group and belonged to the Music Appreciation, Dining Out, and Sunday Brunch Groups.

Ruth was instrumental in setting up the Scholarship Trust Fund in 1983 which she generously supported. She was primarily responsible for two CFUW-Ottawa scholarship awards given annually to deserving students at either Carleton University or the University of Ottawa: The Dr. Ruth Bell Scholarship (\$1,000), awarded to a parttime student with high potential for university studies, and the Ruth Bell Centennial Scholarship Honouring All Members of the Ottawa Club Since 1910 (\$5,000), awarded to an honours student in Women's Studies. Proceeds from her 2004 autobiography, Be a "Nice" Girl! A Woman's Journey in the 20th Century, partially funded the Ruth Bell Centennial Scholarship.

Dr. Bell was a true believer in volunteerism and a strong advocate for education and women's equality. Her impact in these areas form a legacy from which many of us benefit. Her activism and accomplishments beyond CFUW were also substantial. Her accolades include: Member of the Order of Canada in 1981; honorary LL.D from Carleton University in 1984; Governor General's Award in Commemoration of the Persons Case in 2005; and two Canada 125 medals. Her autobiography is included in the collection of the Canadian Museum for Human Rights in Winnipeg.

Many members will remember Ruth's motto adopted during her CFUW Presidency and oft mentioned in her colourful speeches: "Behold the turtle; she makes progress only when she sticks her neck out." Many will

also recall the naughty play on words of her Grace at Club receptions which always earned a chuckle: "Let us always be needful of the minds of others."

Visitation was held at the Central Chapel of Hulse, Playfair & McGarry on Dec. 21, 2015. On Dec. 22, a service of thanksgiving for Ruth's life was held at Christ Church Cathedral, followed by a reception. Dorothy Phillips gave one of the eulogies — to a full church which included many CFUW-Ottawa members. Ruth's obituary was published in the Ottawa Citizen from Dec. 19 to 21 and in The Globe and Mail on Dec. 19 and is found online at www.legacy.com/obituaries/ottawacitizen/obituary.aspx?pid=176956406.
