Democracy at Work!

As we are all well aware by now, there are important votes coming up for CFUW members — at our own CFUW Ottawa AGM on May 10 and at our National CFUW AGM on June 23-24. You will find important information inside this issue about the concerns and decisions that will affect the future of CFUW and all of its member clubs. Our input is needed and it's important that all of us who wish to vote can do so. Note that a motion to amend our constitution or bylaws requires the approval of 67 percent of the eligible votes.

At our club's General Meeting on April 4, I gave formal notice of the motions which will be presented for approval at our club's 2016 AGM on May 10. They are:

1. PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO *CFUW-OTTAWA BYLAWS 2013* (ADOPTED MAY 7, 2013)

- A. <u>Under Article IV Board of Directors</u> and Executive Committee: IV - 1. b) 3. <u>Delete</u> "Projects Convenor" <u>Replace with</u> "Special Projects Convenor"
- B. <u>Under Article V Duties of the Members of the Board of Directors:</u>
 1. V 3. b) 2. The Vice-President Liaison shall:

Delete "the Standing Committees on Education, Status of Women and Human Rights and Legislation/Other" <u>Replace</u> <u>with</u> "the Issues and Advocacy Committee"

2. V - 8. The Projects Convenor Delete "Projects Convenor" <u>Replace with</u> "Special Projects Convenor"

C. <u>Under Article VI – B. Standing Commit-</u> tees:

VI – B. 1. The Issues Committees: Delete "The Issues Committees: i) Education, ii) Status of Women and Human Rights, and iii) Legislation/Other" Replace with "The Issues and Advocacy Committee"

3. AUTHORITY TO VOTE AT THE CFUW AGM The members of CFUW-Ottawa will be asked to give the President or her designate the authority to vote at the national AGM 2016, in accordance with the decisions of this meeting and according to her conscience.

If you wish to participate in the club's vote to be called at our May 10 AGM, you have two choices:

- 1. Attend and vote in person at the AGM (and enjoy a great evening with a delicious dinner); or
- 2. Vote by proxy (assign a proxy person to vote on your behalf)

This is the first time in my experience that our club has made proxy voting available. It is used by both CFUW Ontario Council and CFUW National AGMs, and we are adapting their procedures to our situation. A proxy must be a member in good standing who has registered to attend the AGM, intends to vote on her own behalf, and agrees to also vote on your behalf. Voting will be by show of hands and proxy cards. When your proxy signs in at the event, she will be given a coloured proxy voting card to raise when she is voting as your proxy. Each vote will be called twice: First, for all members present; and second, for members voting as holders of a proxy (who vote by raising their coloured proxy card).

If you wish to participate by assigning a proxy to vote on your behalf:

- 2. Sign the form and have your proxy sign, or confirm by email her agreement to represent you as a proxy and vote according to your instructions.

The United Nations Commission on the Status of Women, held in New York City annually, is the single largest forum for the advancement of the women's empowerment agenda. The 2016 Commission was the first since the UN adopted the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development last September. Its priority theme was women's empowerment and its link to sustainable development. The review theme which framed many of the discussions was the elimination and prevention of all forms of violence against women and girls.

This year, over 8,100 NGO representatives registered and some 600 side events and parallel sessions were presented. I attended many of these presentations and share now a few "takeaways."

Recently, Zeid Ra'ad Al Hussein, the UN High Commissioner for Human Rights, noted that, in some countries today, girls are more likely to die in childbirth than complete their secondary education — a stark reminder of the crippling inequality that many face. Empowerment through education to give women choice and enable their equal participation in all aspects of life is critical to end this pervasive discrimination. Increasing women's leadership and participation; ending violence against women; engaging women in all aspects of peace and security processes;

In session after session, I was reminded that gender inequality, linked to a lack of education for both boys and girls, is the norm in many parts of our world. Its

effect on girls is especially devastating.

The resultant violence is found in Displaced Persons camps in the Ukraine and Georgia and in refugee camps in the Middle East and Europe. It is evidenced in mob rapes

common at concerts in Egyptian stadiums where 60 men will suddenly appear and completely encircle and isolate a woman, each taking their turn. In Iraq, where in 2003 there was a dream of a democratic life, women are now experiencing unimaginable horrors. In Tajikistan, Morocco, and Tunisia, governments have adapted international law to improve the status of women, but ongoing vigilance is crucial, and many women, especially in rural areas, do not know and therefore do not speak for their rights. This is also true in Afghanistan, of particular interest to some of us. The Afghan sessions I attended were superb. We were reminded of the tremendous progress made in that country during the last 15 years and that all could be lost without due care going forward. Again, laws are in place but the justice system must enforce them and the international community must connect its expectations to its desperately needed grants. Last year, 17,000 rapes were committed in the Congo. Just last month, Nigeria budgeted to send a contingent to

> UNCSW60 while rejecting a bill to ensure gender equality in their country. In Sierra Leone, where half the girls are pregnant by age 18, the law requires pregnant girls to leave school. Violence against wom-

en is rampant in Honduras. Our speaker from Honduras shared stories of a 13-year-old raped on her walk to school, of a 26-year-old woman who stayed home day after day with no job, no skills, no learning, only daily beatings, and of a 49-year-old woman who had struggled for 20 years, yet was killed as she slept in her own home. When Phumzile Mlambo-Ngcuka, UN Under-Secretary-General and Executive Director, UN Women, was asked what she would like to see going forward, she said she wanted to see everyone rejoice when a girl was born. Today, in her African village, when a son is born, the

family kills a goat for a celebratory feast. When a girl is born, they cut a pumpkin.

It is important to share from my UN experience my better understanding of the work of our three Graduate Women International (GWI) volunteer UN representatives: Dr. Sophie Turner Zaretsky, Polly D. Woodward, and Mick Minard. These talented women live just around the corner from the UN, are very well informed, politically savvy, have built an amazing network on our behalf, and work tirelessly to advance our work for girls' education around the world.

Returning home, one is reminded of our incredible good fortune, and challenged to respond. We do not live in poverty. We are not hungry. We are not surrounded with violence and discrimination. Rather, we are educated, we have choice, we can influence. In fact, we must be a voice for those who have none. Through our link with GWI, we can work effectively with its National Federations and Associations (NFAs) and members in some 80 countries. It is critical to use our influence, experience, and networks to urge governments and policy makers to commit, without further delay, to concrete pledges to accelerate the advancement and empowerment of women and girls worldwide.

GWI Moving Forward

Over 60 CFUW members from area clubs attended CFUW-Ottawa's special lunchtime meeting on April 15 to hear Susan Russell's talk on "GWI Moving Forward". Graduate Women International (GWI) focuses on improving women's rights, equality, and empowerment through education. GWI aims to have 100 percent of girls achieving education beyond primary school by 2030.


Despite our founders' 1919 vision of improving women's education, there are still 63 million illiterate girls and women worldwide and very few who achieve in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics), which could lead them to enhanced careers.

At the 2013 GWI triennial conference in Istanbul, members voted to modernize GWI. With a new name (IFUW became GWI), our international organization is using technology (website, social media, webinars), has exciting new projects, has secured support from outside partners for the first time, and has welcomed new member countries, including Somalia.

GWI advocates for women at UN agencies and other forums around the world, bringing resolutions prepared by CFUW clubs to meetings in New York, Paris, Geneva, and Vienna, and changing attitudes one step at a time.

A lively discussion followed Susan's talk. Dues paid to GWI was an issue, especially for women on fixed income, many of whom do not have university degrees and are therefore not members of GWI. They pay their full club fee and have access to GWI services but CFUW does not forward their portion as dues. Susan suggested they take this up with CFUW. GWI dues as a portion of CFUW's budget was also discussed. Susan mentioned that GWI dues are based on number of members and a country's GDP. CFUW already pays less than the full rate because of its large membership and relatively strong GDP. What can CFUW do as a member of GWI that it cannot do alone? As one of 60 National Federations and Affiliates (NFA) of GWI, CFUW (and, by extension, its individual membership) gains a strong international voice for the empowerment of women, a goal as important to CFUW as it is to GWI, as relevant in Canada as it is globally.

Intimate Femicide is Predictable: Why Are We Failing to Prevent It?

In her presentation at the CFUW-Ottawa General Meeting on April 4, Professor Elizabeth Sheehy put faces to several recent victims of intimate femicide from our own or nearby communities. All of these women were killed by current or former male partners, though most had asked for protection from the state, and most of their partners/ex-partners had criminal records for violence against women. The men responsible for intimate femicide frequently involve multiple victims and then commit suicide afterwards.

Information about femicide in Canada is found in the Ontario Chief Coroner's Domestic Violence Death Review Committee Annual Reports and in Statistics Canada's Intimate Partner Homicides (IPH) reports. In 2014, 67 women (80 percent of the total number of women murdered) were killed by current or former partners — a rate of one every 4.4 days! Why are we failing to prevent the predictable? Do we fail to value women's worth? Do we fail to characterize the abuse of women accurately? Do we minimize women's experiences by the use of neutral language and the passive tense?

Professor Sheehy gave examples of women who suffered prolonged, repetitive, and violent physical abuse by their eventual murderers — abuse that can only be described as torture. She also gave examples of the language used in court documents such as transcripts of testimony by prosecuting and defence attorneys, which consistently understate and minimize the abuse and suffering of these women. Shouldn't these authorities be bearing witness and advocating on behalf of these terrorized and abused women?

Many factors influence the continued tragic outcomes for women in these intolerable situations including the failure to undertake and respond to risk assessments, failure to protect and provide adequate resources to the victims, and failure to recognize and appropriately punish these heinous crimes.

Professor Sheehy concluded with the following recommendations. We cannot prevent intimate femicide without addressing male violence. We need a National Action Plan to end violence against women. We need to support the independent women's movement. We need new mechanisms for police transparency and accountability. We need new legislation and appropriate penalties for the crime of strangulation. We need to invest in women's safety and freedom and to contain dangerous men. We need a National Femicide Count.

At the conclusion, I was delighted to receive a contribution for scholarships at Dr. Samar's Gawharshad Institute of Higher Education in Kabul.

It's that time of year again! Renew your 2016-17 membership either online or by mailing in your completed Registration Form (see <u>www.cfuwottawa.org/membership</u>). Membership renewal letters will be mailed in August to members who have not provided us with an email address.

Membership fees are the same as last year: full is \$115, full-time university or college student is \$50, and dual (second CFUW club) is \$40.

Your email address is your access to the website. It is essential to use only one email address when accessing the CFUW-Ottawa website. If your email has changed since you last registered as a CFUW-Ottawa member or, if you have any questions, please contact me at <u>member-ship@cfuw-ottawa.org</u> before proceeding.

The printed version of the *Membership Directory* is for sale again this year for \$6. To receive a copy, purchase it when you renew your membership. It will be mailed in November to those that have paid for it. The online directory is available on the website to all current members of CFUW-Ottawa at no additional charge.

In an effort to keep our fees as low as possible, members who wish to receive the *Capital Carillon* in paper format are now required to pay \$15 per year. To purchase this option, select the appropriate box on the Registration Form and include the \$15 in your payment. 

We invite all CFUW-Ottawa members to let us know about deaths in their immediate families or of other significant persons in their lives if they wish to have notices published in the *Carillon*.


